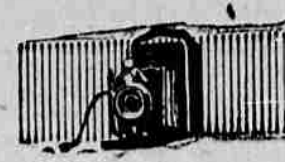
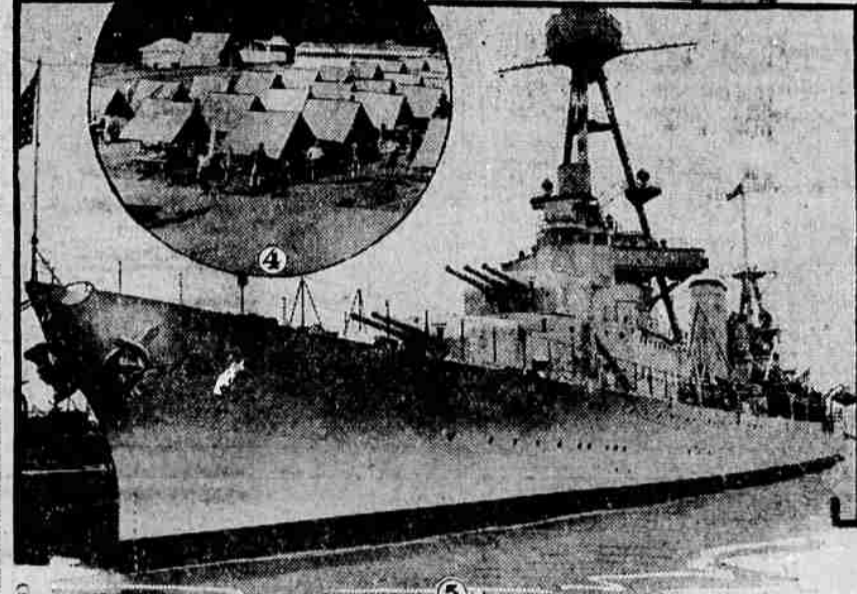
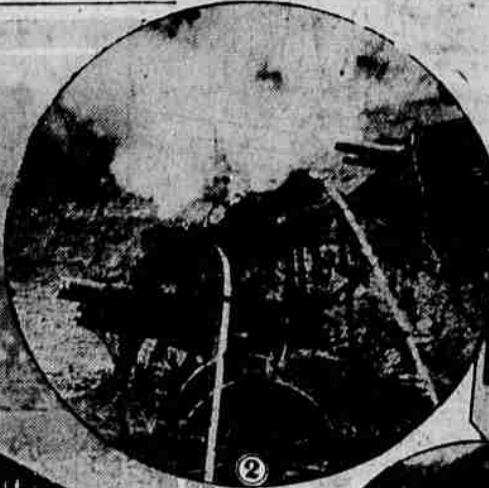

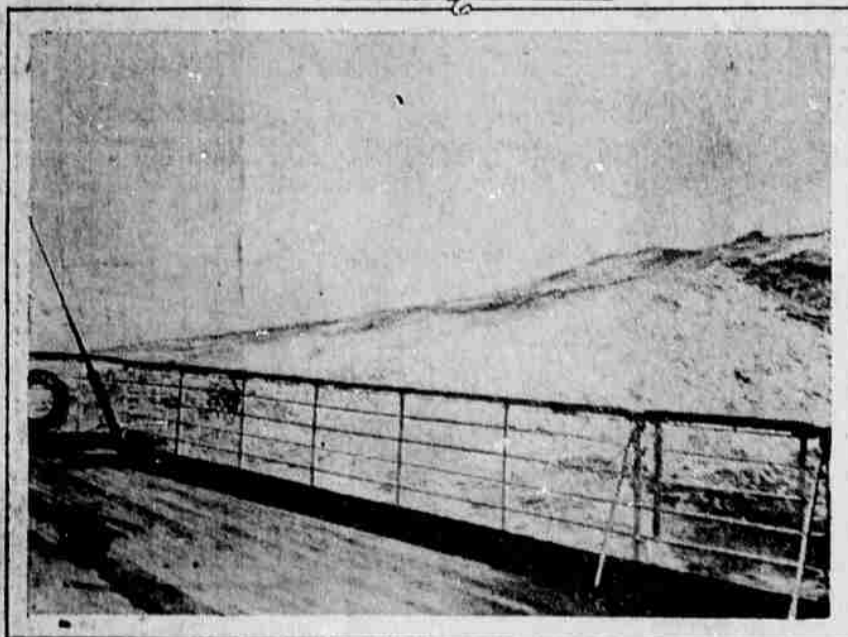

CANNONS ROAR AS DIPLOMATS TALK PEACE—While diplomats in many parts of the world were discussing the London naval arms conference, the great war gods held sway in other places. Pictured above are: (1) French troops crossing the bridge into Coblenz, evacuating the second Rhineland district, bringing back vivid memories of the World War; (2) a field army under cover of camouflage nets in action at the Japanese grand military maneuvers; (3) the Japanese naval delegation to the London conference, greeting Secretary of State Henry L. Stimson, shown at the extreme right; (4) United States marine camp in Haiti, whose troops were stationed as the result of recent rebellions; (5) the U. S. S.
