MEDFORD HIGH PASSIVE UPON STATE LEAGUE

Let Salem and Eugene 'Fight Own Battles' Over Recent Drastic Amendments—Basketball Tournament Favors to Salem High, Makes No Hit With That School, As They Want No Special Rights.

The Medford high school will maintain "a passive attitude" in any formation of a state athletic league of the larger schools, outside of Portland, E. H. Hedrick, superintendent of schools, said last week.

Backers of the amendments, which required athletic coaches to be full time teachers and the pay of coaches to come from school funds, without any public bonds, held that the amendments "would equalize the coach situation."

The superintendent said the athletics were not seeking any "soft spots" during the current and coming lean years, but would schedule games with foes of equal strength.

The action of the state association in giving the Salem high school the right to participate in the state basketball tournament, whatever their status, did not make such a rousing hit with the Salem school and fans.

Full acceptance of the right, by Salem, would give the University of Oregon and Oregon State college a chance to invite the tournament to their gymnasiums.

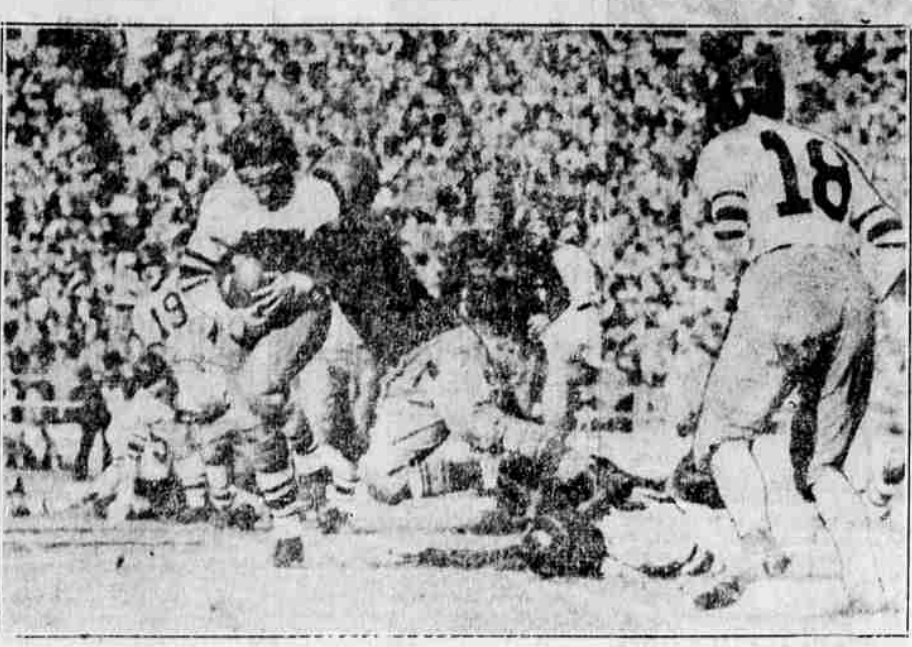
O'GRADY WILL BOX O'DOWD THURSDAY

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene, Jan. 4.—(AP)—All officials involved in the Oregon athletic situation will be on the campus Monday. The most pressing problems before student body and administrative officials are the settlement of Captain John J. McEwan's contract and the signing of a new football coach.

Captain McEwan, who resigned as head coach at the end of the next football season, will arrive here Monday. The athletic committee and the executive council of the associated students, however, countered the coach's resignation and requested his immediate withdrawal to assure the stability of the Oregon athletic policy for next season.

DANGEROUS DAN 'LAID DOWN' IN SHIRES BATTLE

COLUMBUS, Ohio, Jan. 4.—(AP)—The Ohio State Journal tomorrow will say that Dangerous Dan Daly, Arthur (The Great) Shires' opponent when the baseball star entered the pugilistic world in Chicago, early in December, in an interview said today that "he took a dive" in the Chicago bout. He refused to name the men issuing the instructions that he permit Shires to win.

Dangerous Dan Daly is Jim Gerry, a Columbus lad. Following is the interview with Gerry: "Few days before the fight I received a wire from Cleveland asking if I wished to box in Chicago. I accepted without the slightest idea of whom I was going to fight. I arrived in Chicago on Sunday, the day before the fight. They treated me like me like a king and when I worked out in a gymnasium on Sunday afternoon a large crowd assembled, including many newspaper reporters and photographers. I had, of course, been registered at the hotel as Dangerous Dan Daly."

Monday afternoon I was taken on a sightseeing trip and one of the places visited was the county jail. There were a lot of fellows in the hospital ward all banged up who might have been slugged after being taken for a ride. Well, when they told me just before the fight that I was to "take a dive" or else—I thought about those poor fellows in the workhouse and the fact that I had only three dollars in my pocket. I was told that the crowd was larger than expected and that they would give me \$150 and my expenses for my services instead of \$100, as promised. I took a dive."

It was decided that I should go into the ring and mix like we would at each other and then stick out my chin for Mr. Shires to hit it. They told me to fall on my face so that the referee could not see my eyes. I must have done rich for they patted me on the back after the fight and the next day paid me \$150 and also bought me a lot of clothes.

"You can tell the world, however, that Jim Gerry, or Dangerous Dan Daly, whichever they care to call me, can whip 'The Great' Arthur Shires any place except Chicago. I'll even fight him there if they promise not to 'take me for a ride,' if I whip him."
