

Your Glasses Should Be Appropriate to the Occasion

Constant use of the eyes and the strain of civilized life have affected the eyes in varying degrees. Lenses to correct faulty vision technically speaking fall into different groups. Reading Glasses have been designed for seeing objects at a close range such as reading, sewing, and typing, etc. Distant Glasses are for seeing objects at a long distance comfortably and without eyestrain.

Good taste, fashion's dictator, has decreed that one pair of glasses cannot meet every requirement. Suitable styles in glasses have been designed for every occasion.

For general utility, sports wear, and motorizing heavy rimmed shell frames or substantial metal frames are correct. Tinted lenses are recommended for golf, at the seashore or for motorizing.

Semi-dress and business wear allows more latitude in the choice of frames. Spectacles or eyeglasses may be worn either rimless or with light-weight shell, silhouette or fusite rims. For formal attire, good usage has prescribed rimless glasses. Eye glasses with mounting of white gold increase the dignity and charm of formal attire.
