ECLIPSE ENHANCES RADIO RECEPTION

An interesting sidelight of the eclipse was related by Floyd Rush of KMED, the Mail Tribune-Virgin station, this afternoon. During the height of the eclipse, when the sun's disk was obscured to the extent of 82 per cent by the shadow of the moon, the station broadcast a message for its listeners to try and tune in stations from a distance.

Within minutes several calls were received from radio fans who had heard New York City and stations throughout the middle west. This freak is attributed to the absence of sun rays which did not absorb the oscillations of radio transmission.

Perhaps the record would have been even better had the eclipse been total, as it was in California. There the moon, a little over 2600 miles in diameter, 20,000 miles from the earth, totally obscured the sun, 83,000,000 miles from the earth, for one second and a half.
