### Author of Gold Bullets Writes New Mystery For Mail Tribune

Charles G. Booth, whose "Gold Bullets" was among the most widely read mystery novels of recent years, has written another thrilling story of romance and intrigue, "Murder at High Tide," which will appear in the Mail Tribune, a chapter daily, beginning Thursday, May 1.

Booth's unusual talent for developing a striking plot with an abundance of surprising climaxes and gripping suspense, is again evident in "Murder at High Tide." The story moves swiftly and creates a tense excitement, but all the baffling events fit logically together in the solution of the crime.

The author has chosen an interesting background for his story. All the action takes place on San Lucas Island, a tiny bit of land in the Pacific six miles off the California coast.

For more than 100 years, this island has figured in the history of the Pacific. Originally granted by the King of Spain to the Valasco family in the early 1800's, it remained in their possession, a veritable feudal estate, until the beginning of the 20th century, when impoverishment forced them to relinquish the possession.

A crumbling fort on the shore marked the last remains of the owners' hold influence of the westward march of American domination. On the island under its new ownership—Don Parados, called "the most sinister figure on the coast," purchased the place recently—there hung an atmosphere of foreboding. Jealousies, hatreds and intrigues, part of them rooted in the island's century of troublesome history, filled the air.

In this setting, Booth develops an amazing story of romance, intrigue and mystery—a puzzle which will fascinate you from the first chapter in the Mail Tribune, Thursday, May 1.

### LOCAL BUILDERS GIVEN CONTRACT SUMMER PLACES

Construction work has been started on the Rogue River summer homes of Captain Charles N. Black and Frank D. Madison, San Francisco capitalists.

The contract for the Madison place has been awarded to W. H. Moritz and for the Black lodge to Elmer Childers, local contractors. They began operations this morning.

Both contracts provide that local labor and materials purchased from local merchants be used. Lumber for the Captain Black structure will be furnished by the Oregon-Oregon Lumber company.

Both lodges will be completed and ready for occupancy between June 15 and July 1.

The Black lodge is located in the Trail district, and the Madison summer home in the McLeod area.

The Black lodge occupies a 200-acre strip on Rogue river, purchased last fall from Charles Hass, and is planned to be one of the most beautiful and comfortable summer homes on the Pacific coast. It will be 90 by 60 feet, with an exterior finish in California redwood.

The Madison lodge will be 75 by 55 feet in dimensions.
