OAKLAND-SEAL BATTING SPREE SETS A RECORD

Last Week's Efforts Included 108 Hits By Oaks, 84 By San Francisco—Rain Halts Portland Game

(By the Associated Press.) The only safety for a pitcher these days is in the dugout. A perusal of the Oakland-San Francisco box scores last week offers added proof of this fact. The Oaks made 82 runs on 108 hits, while the Seals made a similar number of runs on 84 base hits in the seven-game series. If that is not a record of some kind for Coast league ball, then Recreation park denizens are satisfied to forget the present slug-fests for the tight pitcher's battles of yesterday.

The Oaks took the series from the Seals by one game, as the result of splitting yesterday's double-header. Ernie Lombardi, big catcher of the Oaks, single-handedly wrecked the Seals' chances in the morning by driving in eight runs on five hits, including two home-runs. The score was 13 to 7.

In the afternoon the Seals edged out a victory over their tramway rivals, scoring a run in the eighth to win, 5 to 7. The Oaks finished the week at the top of the Coast league percentage column, one-half game in front of the Sacramento Senators, Solons-Angeles, Division.

The Sacramento and the Los Angeles club split a double-header played at Wrigley field. The Angels captured the first game, 5 to 2, while the Senators bagged the second affair, 6 to 4. Oscar Vitt's Hollywood Stars came back to life after losing four games in a row to the Seattle Indians. The Stars took the last three games of the series from Ernie Johnson's troupe. Vance Page, a young right-hander, held the Indians to one run and six hits in the first game, winning by a count of 7 to 1.

In the second half of the day's program, Emil Dye, former big league hurler, scored an impressive 7 to 2 victory. The Stars scouted Hubbell, who started for Seattle, off the mound in the second inning when they scored five runs.

After playing four and one-half innings of even baseball, the Missions and the Portland Ducks were compelled to suspend further play for the day because of damp weather. "Dutch" Leibe and Carl Mays were tied up in a duel when the game was called.

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GIANTS DISPLAY PENNANT FORM IN SEVEN TILTS

McGraw Men Only Un-defeated Team of Major Circuits—Senators Con-tinue Big Surprise.

By Hugh S. Fullerton, Jr. Associated Press Sports Writer. John McGraw and his New York Giants once more are starting out to upset the baseball dope. The Giants suffered severely from bad spring training weather and seemed due for a lot of early beatings.

The Giants have shown everything a club needs to win a pennant. The first three games were close, but effective pitching and fine fielding gave them the edge.

The Brooklyn Robins became the seventh victims of the Giants yesterday as the New Yorkers hit the deliveries of Bill Clark and Johnny Morrison for 14 solid blows which produced a 10 to 4 score.

The Pittsburgh Pirates, chief threat to Giant supremacy, in the National league, continued their brilliant progress by defeating the champion Chicago Cubs, 9 to 5, for their seventh straight victory.

The St. Louis Cardinals used their blows effectively, combining them with seven walks, to beat Cincinnati, 10 to 5.

Washington Beats A's. Washington's surprising Senators continued to strengthen their hold on the top rung of the American league ladder by defeating the world champion Philadelphia Athletics for the third time in succession, 11 to 6.

The Chicago White Sox and St. Louis Browns produced some surprising results in a hard fought battle that went to Chicago by a 2 to 1 score. A record which had stood for 39 years without being seriously threatened, was equaled in this game when Clancy White Sox first baseman, went through nine innings without a putout or an assist.

The Detroit Tigers broke a long first inning and taking the last game of the series, 7 to 1. Nineteen hits by the Boston Red Sox proved better than Babe Ruth's second home run of the year, although the homer came with two on base in the ninth inning and the Sox gained an 8 to 7 victory over the New York Yankees.
