Pomona Grange met at Central Point last Saturday for an all-day meeting. The day was fine and there was a large attendance. And the dinner that the Central Point ladies served was fine, and needless to say, there was a large and appreciative group in the dining room at noon.

The reports of the masters of the various subordinate Granges in the county show a steady increase in membership, good attendance and interest. One noteworthy feature of most of all reports was the steady increase in the number of Grange fire insurance policies issued. This shows an increased confidence in Grange fire insurance. This is as it should be, for there is no more reliable insurance issued. This insurance is issued only to Grangers and, being mutual, is very cheap insurance, and is one of the benefits which the Grange confers on its members through co-operation.

A committee was appointed by the marketing committee to request local grocers to advertise butter as conspicuously as they do butter substitutes. One woman does why some of our local grocers are more anxious to advance the prosperity of the little yellow man across the seas than they are to advance the prosperity of the farmer at their door. Possibly there is more profit in selling butter substitutes than there is in selling butter. Possibly also, there might be more profit in the grocery business if there was more profit in the local farming business.

The local press is continually holding up before our eyes the need of the local people to trade in Medford, so as to build up our own community. This is a laudable spirit. It appeals loyalty. But why strive to focus the eyes of the people on Medford only, as though it was a separate entity, wholly independent of the surrounding territory? Why not Jackson county as Jackson county made?

If the working men of Medford would like to have a steady pay envelope; if the merchants of Medford would like to have the trade of Jackson county citizens; then they should start a "Buy at Home" campaign, and give their next door neighbor, the farmer, the preference over the little yellow man across the seas, for it is sure that if he, the farmer, prospers, the town merchant will prosper and likewise the town workman.

How would these same workmen that demand butter substitutes, and thus place the local farmer in competition with the Orientals, and incidentally deprive themselves of one of the most wholesome and necessary foods; how would they like to have the situation reversed? How would they like to have us import a thousand or so of these same Orientals into this valley to compete with our local workmen. The motto will hold good: "Do unto others as you would have them do unto you."

The price of butter and milk is not prohibitive. Considering its great food value, it is one of the cheapest foods we have. Jackson county would be better off if not another ounce of butter substitute was shipped into the county. The farmer would be more prosperous, then the merchants would be more prosperous, and then the workman would be more prosperous, because with the general prosperity the pay roll would be more diversified and more sure. Try it and see. Who will start the ball rolling? Will the workmen refuse to eat butter substitutes, or will the merchants refuse to ship them in competition with our local made butter?

Mrs. Mabel Mack, county home demonstrator, gave a very good talk on the value of milk and butter in the diet. Mrs. Fuhrman gave a reading on "The economic tree or the cow," humorous but to the point.

The Pomona contributed to the fund for the "education on the use of milk and butter in the diet" campaign.

John Anderson reported on the work accomplished by the dairy committee.

The committee on education by C. F. Davies and Mrs. Ethel Larthrop, report a plan of work for the Grange to sponsor. The Grange adopted their recommendation that the following subjects be intelligently discussed in every Grange from time to time:

- (a) The principle of consolidation.
- (b) The unit of taxation.
- (c) The method of taxation, i. e. the property tax justifiable.
- (d) Agriculture in small high schools.

Also the recommendation that each Grange in Jackson county sponsor at least one 4-H club was adopted.

A committee of three was appointed to work with other organizations to endeavor to put the fish bill over when it appears on the ballot.

The committee appointed: L. M. Sweet, I. T. Galligar, Henry Conger.

A. C. Mittelsteadt was elected to fill the office of treasurer, which was declared vacant.

This Pomona will make a strenuous campaign to secure the state Grange convention here for 1931. The committee reports co-operation for this by local organizations.

Every farmer is urged to back the prospective cheese factory proposition to the limit. This factory would assist in reducing the surplus of butter fat, which exists through the large use of butter substitutes. It will mean dollars in your pocket if this cheese factory proposition is successfully launched.

The Pomona also went on record as favoring the site for the new county court house which the county court selected, namely, the Washington school site.

The turkey pool committee introduced the manager of a Douglas county Grange co-operative turkey selling organization, who gave the turkey growers and sellers much valuable information.

Others appearing on the program, besides those which we have already mentioned, are: Mrs. Mable Brown and Floyd Charley, vocal duet, accompanied by Mrs. Alma Meyers; Mrs. W. R. Lamb, vocal solo, accompanied by Mrs. Bostwick of Talent; vocal solo by Mrs. Arnold Bohner, accompanied by Mrs. Ethel Freeman; readings by Mrs. Seaguller of Sams Valley and C. F. Davies of Eagle Point. Also several assembly songs.

H. W. Ward was elected as alternate delegate to the state Grange meet.

And thus another very interesting and instructive Pomona meeting closed in time for the farmers to get home in time for supper and the chores.
