## BEAVERS SPLIT DOUBLE HEADER WITH MISSIONS

Fullerton Effective in Second Game — Oak-Angel Series Promises Fireworks at Wrigley Field.

(By the Associated Press) While the other clubs in the league enjoyed their regular Monday holiday, the Portland Ducks and Mission Reds put in double time at the Portland ball yard yesterday. The teams split a double-header, the home guards taking the first game, 5 to 4, and the visitors winning the second, 5 to 1, thus completing their seven-game series.

Featuring the day's play was Ted Pilette, brother of Herman, who is the senior pitcher on the Mission club. Ted held the Ducks to eight hits and, in addition to hurling winning ball, secured three hits. Curtis Fullerton turned in the Portland victory, holding the opposition to nine safeties. This week finds the Seals opposing the Sacramento Senators at San Francisco in their first series of the year. The Senators are in second place, but, unless a jinx or shortcoming that has trailed them for years has left them, they probably will find themselves lower in the percentage column at the end of the week. For the past several years the Seals have had little difficulty in trimming the Sacramento club.

Carl Zamloch's hard-hitting and fighting Oaks met the Los Angeles club at Wrigley field. Zamloch has as good a squad of players as there are in the league and the series with the southern club should be close and exciting. In the north the Missions move to Seattle, where "Red" Killefer will renew acquaintances and try to add a few points to his team's percentage at the expense of the Indians.

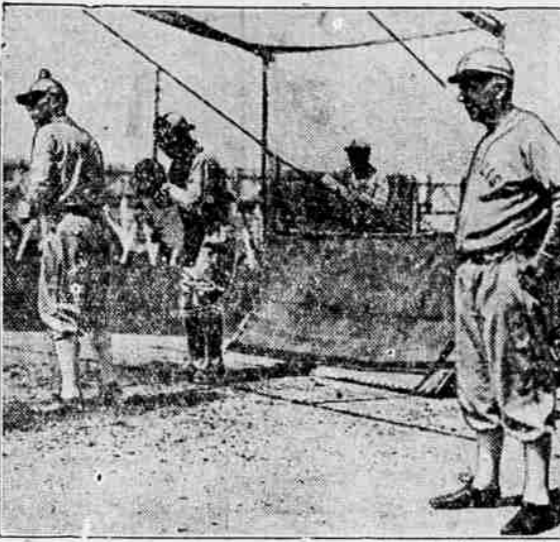

## AMERICAN GOLF BRIGADE READY TO CROSS POND

NEW YORK, April 29.—(AP)—Seven of America's eight Walker cup golf representatives had gathered here today and the eighth was no further away than Washington. With their departure on the Manhattan set for tomorrow afternoon, Bobby Jones, captain of the invincible expedition; Francis Ouimet, Don Moe and Dr. O. F. Willing all arrived in town yesterday to join the three other members of the team, Harrison R. (Jimmy) Johnston, national amateur champion, George Von Elm and George Voigt. The eighth member of the squad, Roland MacKenzie, is expected from Washington today or tomorrow.

Jones believes that the Americans will have a real battle on their hands when they meet the British cup players at Sandwich, on May 15 and 16. "I have seen only the old timers play but I have the greatest respect for them and I hear the younger players are as good or better than the veterans."

### BOSTON SAILOR GETS NOD OVER TOM LOUGHRAN

PHILADELPHIA, April 29.—Tommy Loughran's heavyweight championship aspirations have received another severe jolt this time at the hands of Ernie Schaaf, 21-year-old Boston sailor boy. Schaaf belted his way to a referee's decision over the former light-heavyweight titleholder in a sensational 10-round battle here last night. One of the judges scored Loughran as the winner and the other voted for a draw.

The verdict of the referee, Leo Hauck, precipitated a noisy demonstration on the part of the fans. Most of the fans declared that Loughran should have gotten no worse than a draw. A year ago Loughran, then holder of the light-heavyweight title, won a decision over Schaaf in Boston. But last night he found the Boston job a greatly improved fighter.

## MYSTERY FISH OF LAKE O' WOODS IS TROUT—SO THERE!

Discussion concerning the freak fish caught in Lake of the Woods recently by George Gates still rages. The fish weighed 23 pounds, was 26 inches in length and has been given a long string of names. W. R. Coleman, state superintendent of fish screens, who dared the pain of an injured foot to come down to the lake or so ago to inspect it, declared yesterday at the chamber of commerce in the midst of a heated discussion with Chris Gottlieb that the fish is a rainbow or steelhead trout and is no kin to the salmon family. He believes it is the oldest trout to have ever been caught in southern Oregon by white men and went on to say that it was a veteran of the lake. It must have been 12 years old.

## SENATORS SET DIZZY PACE IN AMERICAN LOOP

Fielding, Hitting and Pitching of Johnson Crew Reverses Pre Season Dope By Experts.

Associated Press Sports Writer) In the face of expert opinion that said they would be lucky to finish any higher than seventh place, Walter Johnson's Washington Senators continue to set a dizzy pace to lead the American league. No one can say, of course, where the Senators will finish, but the fact remains that they are playing heads-up baseball, taking advantage of every break and winning consistently. The club has been fielding brilliantly, hitting opportunely and Johnson has shown rare judgment in juggling his pitchers with Lloyd Brown, Irving Hadley, "Fipps" Marberry and Garland Braxton as a "Big Four."

Yesterday's 6-5 victory over the New York Yankees was the Senators' ninth in eleven games and their seventh in a row. The Chicago White Sox moved up into second place with a 9-7 triumph over Detroit. Carl Reynolds hit a home run triple and single, his homer with Lyons on base in the seventh, really deciding the contest.

The St. Louis Browns could get only five hits off the offerings of Pete Jablonowski. American Association recruit, and Cleveland won, 3 to 1. Wildness on the part of MacFayden and Morris and fielding errors by O. Miller and Rogan enabled the Philadelphia Athletics to score four runs in the ninth without a hit and beat the Boston Red Sox, 5-4.

In the National league, the New York Giants lost their first game of the season, bowing to Brooklyn, 6 to 4, when Harvey Hendrick doubled with the bases filled in the ninth. The defeat broke Bill Walker's string of 11 straight victories. Four home runs, two by Gabby Hartnett and the others by Charley Root and Cliff Heathcote, enabled Chicago's Cubs to beat the Pittsburgh Pirates, 7-4.
