In order to build a solid foundation for the future, much attention is devoted to character training of children in the home, to school instruction in home-making problems and the business side of home ownership.

Although the main emphasis is on practical measures, the educating of individuals and the mobilizing of community action, the movement could never have gained its firm hold in the minds of the American people, nor have accomplished such widespread voluntary service, if it had not met a response in the highest ideals of our people.

President Hoover, in his inaugural address, emphasized leadership in coordinating and strengthening the forces that make for the rebuilding of the home as one of the clearly defined duties of the administration.

Home ownership will be featured by two all-day demonstrations on water systems and septic tanks. A good water supply, a complete sewage disposal plant, effective heating and a good lighting system constitute the four prime utilities of the farm home.

The first demonstration will be held May 7th, at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Oscar Shepherd, near Rogue River, the second one at the home of Mr. and Mrs. H. P. Whistler, near Tolo, May 9th.

VETERAN CONSOLIDATION BILL, PASSES IN SENATE

WASHINGTON, April 30. — (AP) — The Veterans bill to carry out President Hoover's plan to consolidate government agencies handling veterans' affairs was passed today by the house and sent to the senate.

The vote was 390 to 61. Before final passage, the house restored a provision to grant the president board authority to effect the consolidation of the veterans and pensions bureau with the national home for disabled volunteer soldiers.

The editors of The Golden Book Magazine offer their answer to this recurrent question in the current issue of that literary monthly with a selection of 100 books that range through history from the Bible to Bernard Shaw and Theodore Dreiser.

"These are not the 100 books to take to a desert island," say the editors, explaining the selection. "For a desert island library, one may choose astronomy, another natural sciences, another poetry. But in order to stay at home he must know the common heritage of human society. He must be able to speak the languages of civilized mankind or he is virtually on a desert island. And these books are, in our judgment, those which will put that language completely in his possession."
