Ship Bulbs Safely K. M. Ladewig, who is experimenting with different methods of shipping tulip bulbs, has at last found what he thinks is the best way of wrapping them for shipment. A strip of newspaper serves the purpose, and is most satisfactory. He made shipments to Chicago. The stem of each bulb is wrapped in newspaper dry and the blooms are packed in a wooden pruned box, stems to the center and blooms to each end. Holes are bored through the bottom of the box and cord inserted to tie the stems to the bottom of the box to prevent shifting. — Grants Pass Courier.
