IRON HAND APPLIED IN PEN RIOTS

Militiamen Take Command in Ohio Institution—Insurgents to Be Placed in Barbed Wire Stockade—Tensity Prevalent.

COLUMBUS, Ohio, April 30.—The iron hand of the militia ruled Ohio penitentiary today after more than a week of tumult, climaxing yesterday when National Guardsmen entered the prison to put down the mutiny that followed the death of 370 convicts in the fire a week ago Monday.

An atmosphere of tensity still was evident, however, and the revolting convicts, idle since the fire, apparently had not entirely abandoned their "passive resistance" movement by which they hoped to bring about the removal of Warden Preston E. Thomas.

After Colonel Hanrich had led his men into the prison, the staff of prison guards went to the outside, leaving the soldiers in complete charge. A few of the guards had returned today.

Probe Shooting.

Prison officials were investigating a guard's statement that the first shot was fired by a convict. Warden Thomas said the guard, whose name was withheld, told him that no shooting occurred until a bullet came from the direction of the cell blocks.

Two convicts were wounded, one seriously, as the bullets scattered their ranks. George Tomof of Toledo was near death with a shot through the lung, groin and hips. While Jewel Joffa, Lucas county, was recovering from a leg injury. Pending repair of the idle house cell locks, broken during the disorders, the insurgents will be placed in a barbed-wire stockade in the prison yard. Guards started erecting the stockade last night, to have it ready for the convicts this morning. The prisoners will have to sleep in tents within the stockade until repairs to the cell blocks are completed. Deadlines will be established and guarded by the troops.

Remain During Trouble.

It was indicated the soldiers will remain on duty until the mutineers return to the cell blocks and are brought under discipline.

Milling about with other prisoners in "White City" yesterday were four men under death sentence, who were released by the revolters. All were rounded up, however, and today were in city jail. Three others who declined to leave death row also were taken to the jail.

Belief that no further disorders would occur was expressed by Colonel Hanrich and Warden Thomas.

Attorney-General Gilbert Bennett's report on the investigation of the fire was in the hands of State Welfare Director Hal H. Griswold today, following its completion last night.

FARM DWELLINGS PRINCIPAL ITEMS STATE FIRE LOSS

SALEM, Ore., April 30.—Farm properties, particularly dwellings and contents, constitute the major item in fire losses for Oregon, outside of Portland, during March, according to the monthly estimate by Clara A. Lee, state insurance commissioner and ex-officio state fire marshal.

Of the total of 111 fires reported for the month 31 occurred in farm dwellings and caused \$53,414 in damage which is 35 per cent of the state's total for the month.

Forty fires in city dwellings caused damage of only \$51,245.

Total losses from all fires for the month was \$241,217, which is \$58,877 more than the March losses for 1929.

Losses for the first three months of this year total \$1,196,565, which is an increase of \$340,516 over the 1929 record first quarter losses and \$58,213,232 greater than the average first quarter losses for the previous six-year period.

California-Oregon Trail Expeditions
Ewing Young, 1834.....1837
Wilke's Scientific.....1841
Joseph Gale.....1843
etc., etc.

"Your association has done a splendid thing in arousing interest (and appreciation) in the story of the west. Too many Californians seem to have regarded the American history of California as contained in the two pages words 'Bear Flag' and '49.'" All else appear to have been regarded as insignificant and pre-historic. Your work will, I hope, result in the substitution of American history for American mythology as now taught."

The California-Oregon Trail originally threaded its way thru the wilderness from Portland to San Francisco. Along it now are such cities as Eugene, Medford, and Ashland, Oregon and Yreka, Sisson, Dunsmuir, Redding, Red Bluff and Marysville, California.
