ROSEBURG ADVENTS IN CREED ROW

Church Disbands—Members Dropped for Objection to Fundamental Principles—Tithing—Confession—Religious Bible. ROSEBURG, Ore., May 1.—(AP)—Organization of an "independent" church of Seventh Day Adventists is complicated by members of the local congregation who were dropped from membership in the Roseburg church for refusing to accept three-stage agreement settling their views of faith and practice. The question of tithing and of confession are the chief points of contention.

Self Enforcement Only Solution of Drinking Problem

HARLESTON, S. C., May 1.—(AP)—The national congress of the Protestant Episcopal church was told today by Bishop Samuel D. Booth of Vermont the only solution to the prohibition problem was "self-enforcement." He asserted prohibition is an individual problem calling for self-discipline. "The law of Jesus Christ and the responsibility of the individual society under it is the only law which seems strong enough to solve this problem," he said.

POLICEMEN ROUT REDS IN OAKLAND

Attempted Communist Parade As May Day Feature Broken by Working Men—Blight if Necessary Said Leader of March. OAKLAND, Cal., May 1.—(AP)—Thirty Oakland policemen personally directed by Chief of Police James T. Dow charged more than 50 men and women attempting to parade under Communist banners here today and dispersed them. One unidentified party, bleeding profusely, was carried away in the police patrol wagon. The police had received a complaint from a neighborhood resident that any parade, organized as an international labor day demonstration, would be stopped by police.

CENTRAL POINT BOYS ELECTED AT CORVALLIS

James Kinoid Named Assistant Cheer Leader—George Eiden On Co-op Board of College. CORVALLIS, Ore., May 1.—(AP)—George Kinoid of Portland was elected president of the Associated Students of Oregon State College in the annual election which ended in an almost unanimous victory for the so-called republican ticket. Kinoid received 5,000 votes to 4,000 for Frank Kinoid, an independent placed on the ballot by political forces. Kinoid's opponent received 10,000 votes in the election.

NEW LIQUOR ALLOWANCE DISCUSSED

Enforcement Commission Is Trying to Work Out Different Plan for Distribution in Prohibition—Chief Is Headed by Senator. WASHINGTON, May 1.—(AP)—Will H. Hays, director of the board of the American Association for the Prohibition Amendment, today told the four members of the enforcement commission that he had a plan for the distribution of liquor in the event of prohibition. He said the members of the commission were Judge Keeble, Judge Frank Johnson, and Judge Charles S. Wood of Philadelphia, which expressed the opinion that President Hoover is beginning to doubt whether prohibition can be enforced.
