CHAMBER HITS FARM AID FROM FEDERAL FUNDS

WASHINGTON, May 1.—(AP)—The chamber of commerce of the United States today adopted a resolution proposing an amendment to the agricultural marketing act to repeal the authority of the federal farm board to use federal funds for the purpose of participation in business in competition with established agencies.

The resolution advocated, however, the continuance of the federal farm board as an agency for the dissemination of information and the ascertaining of conditions of overproduction and for advice as to its prevention.

It was also recommended that the chamber call a conference of wide representation, including the farm cooperative leaders, to study and define measures of sound and effective agriculture.

A bank president and the head of a railroad today described the nation's tax situation before the chamber as "a combination of many muddles" and recommended a "legislative holiday" and "exalted economy" as the solution.

APPROPRIATION FOR VETS EYED

Director Hines of the Veterans Bureau today estimated the total yearly cost of the veterans' hospital program to be \$1,000,000.

He is now working for a grant of \$1,000,000 from the federal government to cover the cost of the program.

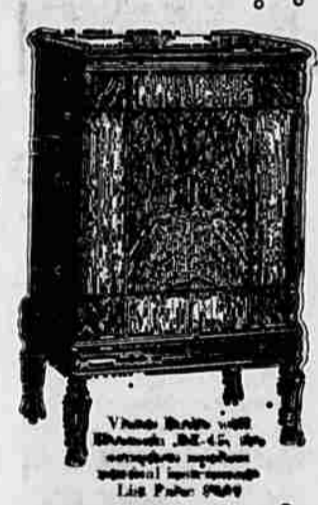

CENSUS RECHECK READS 11,000 NAMES

With the addition of more names today, the recheck of the Medford census has resulted in a tentative count of over 11,000 people. C. T. Baker, chamber of commerce secretary, directing the efforts to locate all unenumerated Medford citizens, said this afternoon. The district census headquarters this afternoon sent down information that Medford may have the remainder of the week to complete the check.

Efforts to locate persons missed by enumerators will continue and persons not yet reached are urged to telephone or call at the chamber of commerce. The recheck so far has resulted in the adding of over 150 names.

ASK STOCK TRADE GENERAL MOTORS

NEW YORK, May 1.—(AP)—Directors of the General Motors Corp. today recommended to stock holders that the corporation issue of 6,000,000 shares of new 5 per cent preferred stock be exchanged for the present senior securities. Directors declared the regular quarterly dividend of 75 cents on the common stock, and the regular dividends on the senior issues.

If the new issue of stock is approved, 1,370,000 shares will be offered in exchange for the present 1,355,738 shares of 7 per cent preferred outstanding, and 6 per cent preferred and debenture stocks.
