SPRAY SCHEDULES ON CODLING MOTH GIVEN BY AGENTS

Apples.
Codling moth eggs will be hatching into young worms by the middle of the month. The moth flight and egg-laying is fairly uniform over the entire valley, according to observations made of moth traps located in orchards ranging from Table Rock to Ashland.

The first cover spray for apples should be on by May 13. As there will be only a small portion of the codling moth eggs laid at the time of this spray and as no young scale or mites are present, it is advisable to use arsenate of lead only at the rate of three pounds of the powdered material to one hundred gallons of water.

All variety of pears should be covered by the 13th as recommended for apples. Use three pounds of powdered arsenate of lead to one hundred gallons of water. No oil is necessary in this spray.
