

STOCKS RALLY IN FINAL HOUR OF HECTIC DAY

NEW YORK, May 5.—(AP)—Stocks rallied violently in the last half hour of trading on the New York Stock Exchange, today, as powerful supporting orders were thrown into the market and bears scrambled to cover their short commitments.

Wall Street rumors that some of the leading bankers who acted to stabilize the market last fall were regarded as a factor in the rally to cover, but these rumors lacked confirmation.

Closing quotations showed a fairly even distribution of gains and losses, with several leading issues closing higher, after having recorded new low levels for the movement in a bear drive during the middle of the afternoon.

Trading was in high volume, total sales running close to 8,000,000 shares the latest day's turnover since last November.

Price movements in some of the more volatile issues were spectacular. Vanadium, after tumbling more than \$17 a share, regained its loss and closed at \$10, up \$2. American & Foreign Power, after dropping more than \$11 to a new low for the year, regained all but \$3 of its loss.

U. S. Steel was a leader in the late rally, after sliding down to close to its low of the year at \$166, it rebounded to \$174. Radio, after reaching a new low for the current decline below \$12, closed at \$17.75, up \$1.50.

Standard Oil of N. J., Consolidated Gas, Atchafalpa, General Electric, and American Telephone, ended the day with gains of \$2 to \$4, while Westinghouse was up \$6.75.

The ticker did not print the final quotation until 5:10 p. m., two hours and 10 minutes after the close.

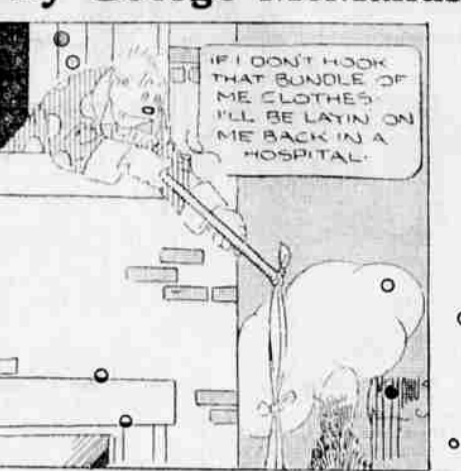
