## DON MOE GETS BIG THRILL IN GOLF INVASION

### American Walker Cup Team Arrives in England—Jones Predicts Hard Battles in Tourney.

PLYMOUTH, England, May 6.—(P)—Members of the American Walker cup team reached England today on the Mauretania. All disembarked except Bobby Jones, who remained aboard and proceeded to Southampton. He expressed the opinion that the team's prospects were good.

"But," Jones said, "I am sure that we shall have a very hard fight for I think that Great Britain has got together her strongest team in years. I myself have been playing very well I suppose, but having played a lot of golf I don't like to say too much about that. I have not played for three weeks, however, and got only a little practice on the boat. We shall see how we shape up when we get down to hard practice."

Jones would not commit himself on probable pairing of his men in the foursomes. The junior member of the team, Donald Mac, evidently was thrilled over his first visit to England. "The responsibility thrown upon us by the golf association rather frightens me," he said, "but I'm determined to play my very best. I know I'll have a wonderful time."

## 248 PINS TAKES LEAD IN SINGLES

SEATTLE, Wash., May 6.—(P)—The half way mark was scheduled to be reached tonight in the 18th annual northwestern international bowling congress.

The majority of early leaders in the various classes continued to hold their places through yesterday's play. The Oregonian five of Portland rolled into third place in the five-man commercial division last night with a score of 2651. The only first place to change hands yesterday was in the booster class when the Telephone Pioneers of Seattle forged to the top with 2567.

Harold Danley of the Oregonian team scored the highest single game total of the tournament to date when he cracked 248 pins last night.

The Milwaukee specials of Tacoma battered 2526 pins to climb into third place in the booster class.

Wolfe is 27 years old, 6 feet 2 inches tall and weighs 190 pounds. He graduated from Forest Grove high in 1922, and from Pacific university in 1926. He made a name for himself as guard and tackle on several Pacific teams.

All four of the principal American golf champions will join the invasion of British links launched with the end of April and continuing until the middle of June.

The biggest parade of club swingers ever organized for the advance on the Lion's Links is headed by Bobby Jones, captain of the amateur Walker Cup team and holder of the national open crown; Glenna Collett, the women's champion; Harrison Johnston, the amateur king; and Leo Diegel, professional champion, who also holds the Canadian open title.

The most conspicuous figure missing from this convention of champions is Walter Hagen, American holder of the British open title for the past two seasons. Cyril James Hastings, of course, will be there to defend his hold on the British amateur sceptre, but Joyce Wethered has retired and will not defend the British women's championship as she has so often done.

The best previous year that the Yankee golfers have ever enjoyed on British soil was 1926—the year that Bobby Jones captured the British open for the first time at Lytham and St. Anne's, Jess Sweetser won the British amateur at Muirfield and the two combined

## SONNENBURG IS MAT MASTER IN MARSHAL BOUT

LOS ANGELES, May 6.—Some 17,000 persons with an evening and \$76,000 to spend for entrance fees, last night saw "Gibby" Gus Sonnenberg cling to the claim he lays to the world heavyweight wrestling crown. He tackled his

way to the two concluding falls of a finished exhibition after Everett Marshall, La Junta, Colo., grappler had annexed the first set with a prolonged airplane spin in less than half an hour.

The student marvel took the first fall in 31 minutes after hoisting the champion for a lengthy twirl in the "airplane spin," application of which usually leaves the victim in no condition to continue the evening's entertainment.

Sonnenberg came back, however and made quick work of the young matman, taking the second fall in 11 minutes and the third in one minute, 22 seconds, by repeated flying tackles, using his head as a battering ram in his opponent's abdomen.

The match, which came to a sensational close, was not otherwise distinguished as a spectacle for the Wrigley Field crowd, which expected a highly interesting battle of skill and brawn.

Sonnenberg's title, also claimed by George Shikat, was at stake.

## INDIAN WRESTLER COLORFUL FIGURE

Yaqui Joe, the lithe Indian grappler, scheduled to tangle with Gob Watkins here next Monday night, has had a colorful career and, although just out of his teens, the bronzed warrior has seen his native Mexico torn asunder by revolutions on four different occasions.

Yaqui Joe, whose real name is Jose Chashtahau, is of the Yaqui tribe of Indians located at Senora. Each revolution finds rival factions making overtures to these people because of their unexcelled fighting qualities. They are declared to be the bravest fighters in all Mexico.

Left alone in peace in their mountain fastnesses, they are quiet and harmless, but when aroused and in their war paint, they prove fearless. Their home life is spent in farming and their pastime is hunting and fishing. Their sports are wrestling and running.

Joe's ability was discovered by the late Matty Matsuda while the Japanese was touring Mexico and was brought to the United States. After two years he created a sensation.

The Indian won 19 straight contests before he was defeated and Matsuda predicted: "He will win the middleweight championship inside of five years."

## A'S OVERCOME BAD HABITS TO RECOVER LEAD

### Fifth Successive Victory Over Browns Chalked Up When Simmons Gets Circuit Clout in 12th.

Connie Mack's Philadelphia Athletics have overcome the spotty play that marked their early-season efforts and vaulted back into the lead in the American league race.

At Simmons' fifth homer of the season enabled the A's to register their fifth successive victory at the expense of the St. Louis Browns yesterday, 4 to 3, in 12 innings. It was the sheer power, rather than the continuity of the champions' batting that beat the Browns. Lefty Grove, A's ace southpaw, was pounded for three runs in the first two innings but Joey Holey hit two home-runs and Mule Haas one to tie the score by the end of the sixth inning. Five and one-half innings of scoreless baseball followed before Simmons broke up the gang. Grove went the route for the A's, as did Alvin Crowder for the Browns.
