## HARBOR ACTIVITY TOLD ROTARIANS BY A. H. BANWELL

Work being accomplished by the Southern Oregon-Northern California Development company was reviewed to members of the local Rotary club at the noon luncheon at Hotel Medford today by A. H. Banwell, secretary of the company. Development of the Crescent City harbor was the topic to which Mr. Banwell devoted most of his speech, covering in detail the recent hearing held in Crescent City attended by representatives of cities reaching from Portland to San Francisco.

The organization promoting the development of the harbor, Mr. Banwell stated, is receiving more publicity than any other on the coast. The amount of interest each city is taking in the project, he pointed out can be discerned through the columns of the press.

K. I. Dazy, who plans to leave this city soon to accept a new position in San Francisco, was called upon to give his reasons for departing. Resignations were received by the club from C. A. Swigart, Louis B. Humphrys and Glen Jackson.

## GARBAGE DUMPING ON RURAL HIWAYS HIT IN RADIOCAST

Unsanitary garbage dumps on all Jackson county rural roads and lanes are doomed, say those working on plans for the state-wide highway cleanup to take place Saturday May 10. Dumping trash along Jackson county highways must be stopped, they say, and every effort is being made to see that it is.

Roads strewn with all kinds of trash and tin can piles certainly leave an unfavorable impression upon the mind of the visitor, Mrs. Leland J. Metzger, president of the Medford Garden club, points out.

Rogue River valley is attempting to attract new residents, but the messy roads leading into country districts surely keep many away, she says.

Rural residents throughout the area are sponsoring the cleanup move. They say they are getting tired of city dwellers using their neighborhoods for trash dumps.
