

HOOD RIVER BERRY CROP IS DAMAGED

PORTLAND, May 5.—(AP)—Butter values appeared to be steadier today with supplies on the street lighter than usual. No change was made in prices at the produce exchange.

The supplies were liberal and demand light. No price changes were announced. Reviewing the fruit and vegetable situation, the Portland Bureau of the U. S. Department of Agriculture says:

"Strawberry receipts were curtailed due to rains at California shipping districts Saturday; consequently, supplies were cleaned up at an early hour, at \$2.75 per 20-pint crate. Frost throughout the Hood River district last Saturday night resulted in much damage to strawberries there.
