

# ROUGH HIGHWAY WILL BE OILED SOON BY COURT

### Sunshine Needed Before Work Begins — Heating Plant to Be Set Up — Detour Oiling Completed.

Preliminary arrangements for the oiling of the Ruch-Jacksonville highway have been completed by the county engineer's office, it was reported at the regular meeting of the county court today.

The road, built in 1921, has been subjected to heavy traffic since then, and the macadam was badly worn in spots, and the "shoulders" in some spots had become soft. New gravel has been applied, and as soon as the weather settles, the work of oiling the route will be started. It will be finished in ample time for the summer travel.

An oil heating plant will be established near the railroad tracks, in the south part of town, and will be connected to the road by a line of pipes. The oil must be heated to between 350 and 400 degrees F., when applied. The truck tank has an asbestos covering of about four inches. The oil is thick and unless it has a high "fluosity," will not squirt, smear, or saturate, freely.

### Detour Oiled

The work of oiling the Pacific highway detour has been completed, but the wet weather has cut into some of the efficiency, and, according to County Engineer Manning, there is almost as much on the weeds alongside the road, as on the road. The oil does the weeds no good, so some value is received.

The county oiler this week applied smudge oil on a half mile stretch of Ross Lane, near the junction with the Central Point-Jacksonville road, as an experiment to see how it would mix with the granite base. If it proves satisfactory, it will be applied the entire length.

Outwises along rural routes have requested the county court to apply oil thereon, so they will not be bothered by heavy clouds of dust next summer. Their requests will be granted as far as possible, and as long as the finance hold out.

Routine matters and the first of the month quota of bills, was the principal business before the court. There were few callers.

# LOCAL DRY AGENT HELD INNOCENT IN PORTLAND CHARGE

L. O. Shirley, federal field prohibition agent, left Medford today morning for Portland, accompanied by Federal Agent Moon, who was mentioned in a dispatch yesterday as arrested for possession of moonshine and liberty on his own recognition. The two officers came to Medford to drive back autos that had been in storage here for the government.

Moon, a former Ashland man, is declared by fellow officers to be innocent of the charge as at the time he was arrested, he was working on a case that meant the breaking up of a big Portland moonshine ring, the object of efforts by prohibition forces for months.

Moon had been employed in a number of garages as mechanic and was doing undercover work in an effort to get on the inside of the ring and had made a successful entry when plans were thrown amiss by the appearance of the police when he had a quantity of moonshine in his car as a part of a plan to reach the ringleaders of the concern.


