**RALPH WILLIAMS**  
**VALUE TO STATE**  
**TOLD BY ADAMS**

F. J. Adams, former member of the Oregon state highway commission, former secretary to Senator Robert N. Stanfield and now connected with the Federal Trade Commission in Washington, has been in close touch with the service rendered by the Oregon party and the state of Oregon by Ralph Williams, national committee man, who is a candidate for re-nomination at the May primaries. Mr. Adams writes:

"I understand there is opposition to Ralph Williams for national committee man from Oregon. I am sorry to hear this.

"As a delegate to the last three national conventions and being in Washington for the last ten years, most of the time, I have had occasion and opportunity to see Mr. Williams in action, and am deeply impressed with his work and value to Oregon.

"He stands very high with the administration and the big men of the nation that have power and influence here. He is recognized as a keen observer, clear thinker and wise counselor in all the affairs of party and state.

"He was one of the first big men of the nation to advocate the nomination of Hoover for president, was a staunch and valued supporter of the president throughout the campaign, and is now one of the few select men with whom the president advises when considering important national problems. This has compelled him to be in Washington much of the time since the president was inaugurated.

"This position is not a plum, but a costly responsibility. It has cost him thousands of dollars per year to serve in this capacity. Of course another man could hold the position with less cost to himself, but to associate with the big men of influence here, on their level, and keep in touch as Williams does, costs money a plenty, but the contacts and influence attained are all to the good for Oregon.

"Another thing of advantage to Oregon is the close cooperation with every member of the Oregon delegation in congress and the material assistance he can and does render them.

All of Oregon has gradually become aroused over the menace to its highways—highways made unequal in scenic beauty by nature and horribly spoiled by carelessness and unthinking people. Signs of every description have been nailed or painted on trees and fences; huge billboards cut off views which should be enjoyed, fences and buildings have been allowed to fall in decay and disuse, while trash of every description, from scraps of paper to broken machinery, has been dumped by the roadside or on other property. No one person or organization can possibly remedy these conditions.

Therefore, it has become a civic problem for each and every individual, backed up by the many strong organizations which have become keenly interested.

The Oregon Federation of Garden clubs has taken the lead and enlisted the active support and assistance of the forestry department, county court, Boy Scouts, chambers of commerce, community clubs, highway commission and Girl Scouts.

With these organizations behind the movement, the person who refuses to assist by cleaning up his own property bordering on any road in the state, or who continues to do the things which have been done in the past, is sure to find himself very unpopular and a target for much adverse criticism.
