## BOWLING TEAMS SEE CHANCE TO BEAT SEATTLE

## Tacoma Kegler Picks 8-10 Split in Tourney—Seattle Man Scores Ten Consecutive Spares.

SEATTLE, May 8.—(AP)—With leading Seattle teams out of the way, out of town fives stand an excellent chance of carrying off the five man major championship in the 18th annual Northwestern International Bowling congress in the last three days of play.

Seattle's strongest combinations competed last night with three leading on top in the feature race—the Borgman Hotel No. 1 five going into a tie with the Salem Legionnaires of Salem, Ore., for first place and the Cornelius cafe and Puckett Company teams rolling into second and third places, respectively.

Among the leading five man combinations to compete tonight are East Side Commercial club, Heathman Hotel and Imperial, both of Portland.

Langley and Churchill of Seattle continue to lead in the major with 145 and Oscar Stevenson of Wenatchee continues to hold the top post in the major singles with 661.

The Capitol Electric company of Olympia is still showing the way in the commercial five man division with 2654, Winter and Garway and Brown and Lewis, both of Vancouver, B. C., lead in the commercial double with 1173 each and Vanwieder of Salem is the high man in the commercial singles with 652.

H. W. Hingley of Wenatchee tops the major all events with 1746 and Brown, Vancouver, holds first place in the same event in the commercial division. William Craig of Bremerton unseated Harold Danley of Portland for the best single game score of the tournament when he counted 255 pins in his doubles match yesterday.

According to old timers, the first 8-10 split to have ever been scored in the history of the congress was made last night by Lindsay Campbell of the Chamber of Commerce No. 1 team of Tacoma.

The unusual feat of scoring ten consecutive spares in a single game was hung up by Eddy Bergman of the Puget Sound Power & Light company's No. 1 team of Seattle last night. Bergman's score for the game was 184.

## Jones in Four Cup Plays Has Yet to Lose Singles

NEW YORK.—(AP)—Although he has played in only four of the five Walker Cup competitions be-

foursoomes. To win his singles in 1922, 1924, 1926 and 1928, the American open champion had to stop four great British golfers, Roger Wethered, C. O. Hazet, Cyril Tolley and Phil Perkins.

In the foursomes he has played with four different partners, Jess Sweetser, W. C. Fownes, Jr., Watts Gunn and Chick Evans. This year he will have his fifth colleague, for none of the other four is a member of this year's team.

With nine major titles won in seven years, the Atlanta lawyer will have a chance in this visit to England to add the only one he has failed to win—the British Amateur.

He has played in the event twice, losing in 1921 in the fourth round and in 1926 going out in the sixth round. He will play, too, in the British open, in which he led the field home in 1926 and 1927.

Boosting their total of hits to 39 for two consecutive days, the Angels defeated the San Francisco Missions, 14 to 4, at San Francisco in a contest that looked like a baseball game until the third inning, then dragged along slowly to a late finish. The Angels gathered 20 hits while defeating the Missions Monday and added 19 to this number yesterday. The Senators' victory broke a tie for second place between them and their opponents of this week.

Vance Page, young Hollywood righthander, handed out 15 hits at Los Angeles, but San Francisco was hard put to eke out a 4 to 3 victory. John Miljus helped out his own cause by gleaming two doubles and a pair of singles in five chances, meanwhile holding the Stars to eight scattered hits.

CHICAGO, May 8.—(AP)—Four National league veterans have been declared ineligible by Commissioner Kenesaw M. Landis for failure to sign new contracts.

They are Edd Roush, giant-outfielder; Johnny Cooney, Boston infielder; Chester Nichols, Philadelphia pitcher, and J. Pete Fowler, pitcher for the St. Louis Cardinals.

Should the ineligible have a change of heart and decide to sign new contracts, they must be reinstated by Commissioner Landis from suspension deductions with salaries for idleness.

## FLYING TOE HOLD BRINGS CURTAINS FOR INDIAN'S FOE

Yaqui Joe's flying toe hold promises to be a revelation for Medford wrestling fans when he uses it next Monday evening in a finish match against Gob Watkins at the armory. The hold has never been demonstrated in Medford and if once applied, the Indian always wins the fall. The Indian is coming from Texas directly to Medford and if he wins over Watkins, he will probably be seen in a match here against Wildcat Pete of Eugene.

Joe's pet hold is obtained in the manner of a ball player making what is known as the fade-away slide. The Indian, standing erect, quickly throws his body to one side as the opponent rushes in. With the same movement, he throws his legs to one side, tripping his onrushing foe who falls on his stomach and is caught with a perfect toe hold from which none have been known to escape. The Indian does not use his hands after getting the hold, obtaining the necessary leverage with his legs, described as being similar to iron in their strength.
