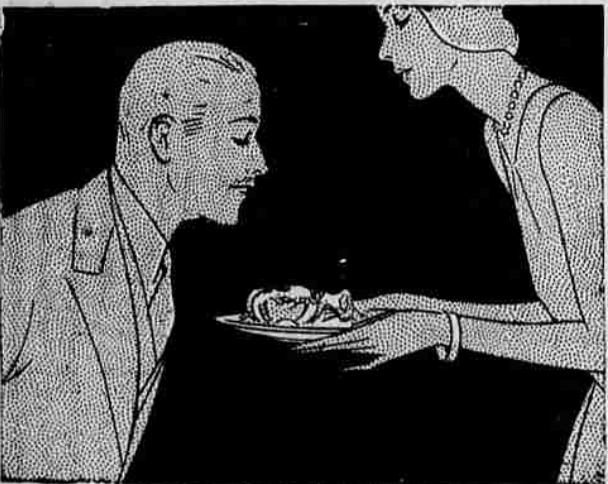
Mr. and Mrs. Chas. M. English are expected to return to Medford Sunday from Los Angeles. They are leaving that city today by motor.

E. F. L. Sturdee, for the last three years assistant general passenger agent of the Canadian Pacific Railway in Montreal, and well known in this city.

Mr. Sturdee's entire lifetime has been spent in the employ of the Canadian Pacific company. Joining the organization when he was a young man, he progressed through the various inter-office posts until he received his appointment as assistant general passenger agent in Boston, Mass.

GRANGERS SEEK KLAMATH BRIDGE

KLAMATH FALLS, Ore., May 9.—(AP)—The Henley grange, largest Klamath county farm organization, last night petitioned the county court for a bridge over the Klamath river south of Klamath Falls, to connect the southern section of the valley with the Green Springs highway.

In another petition the grange recommended that a measure be put on the November election ballot on creating the office of lieutenant governor for Oregon.

NEW YORK, ST. LOUIS ON THROUGH AIRWAY

WASHINGTON (AP)—A trunk airway joining New York and St. Louis has been approved and will be established by the aeronautics branch of the department of commerce.

New installations, to be extended over sections totaling 645 miles, will include 50 beacon lights, five radio range beacons, and 12 intermediate landing fields.

The line will pass through Indianapolis, Columbus, Pittsburgh, and Philadelphia, serving major intermediate points and enabling connections to be made for the west and southwest.

PINE LOGGERS GATHER FOR KLAMATH MEETING

KLAMATH FALLS, Ore., May 9.—(AP)—The Pacific coast pine loggers' conference opened here today with a trip through the Weyerhaeuser lumber plant, followed by a trip to the camp where latest logging methods were viewed. Representatives of the industry are here from Washington, Idaho, California and many sections of Oregon.

Ben Bush, Idaho state forester, and Ike Nash, Idaho land commissioner, are attending the conference to study slashing disposal methods.

R. S. SHAW, LUMBERMAN PASSES IN PORTLAND

PORTLAND, May 9.—(AP)—Robert S. Shaw, 55, Oregon lumberman, died in a hospital here last night after a ten days' illness induced by blood infection. He was born in Albany and early became associated with his father in the lumber business. The elder Shaw founded the Santiam Lumber company at Mill City.

YALE STUDENTS STAGE DISORDER

NEW HAVEN, Conn., May 9.—(AP)—Seven Yale students, four of them wearing bandages around their heads, were fined \$25 each today on charges of breach of the peace as the result of clashes with police, growing out of the annual freshman celebration last night and early today.

Three of the 11 arrested were discharged by the court when they proved that they had no connection with the rioting, and one is to be arraigned later, after his release from a hospital.

O'GRADY SIGNED FOR OAKLAND GO

OAKLAND, Cal., May 9.—(AP)—Signing up of Willard Dix of Bellingham, Wash., and Gene O'Grady of Ashland, Ore., light heavyweight, for a 10-round bout here next Wednesday night was announced today by Promoter Louis Parente. Dix's heavy punching has made him a drawing card here after two fights.

MASEFIELD NAMED AS POET LAUREATE

LONDON, Eng., May 9.—(AP)—John Masefield, the celebrated English poet and writer, today was appointed poet laureate.

The new poet laureate is known as the "hobo poet." He has romped the world hobo fashion and once was a porter in a New York saloon. He is 55 and has a wife and two children.

His struggle for success was of many years' duration.

M'MINNVILLE FRUIT DESTROYED BY FIRE

MCMINNVILLE, Ore., May 9.—(AP) Fire destroyed the Wells Fruit Packing company plant here today with a loss of \$70,000, leaving the frame structure a mass of ruins. Origin of the fire had not been determined several hours later. Loss of the building and equipment was set at \$42,000. Packed fruit, ready for shipment, was destroyed with a loss of \$25,000.

DEAN STRAUB NAMED UNIVERSITY EMERITUS

EUGENE, Ore., May 9.—(AP)—Confirmation of the appointment of Dr. John M. Straub as dean emeritus of men at the University of Oregon was made by the state board of higher education, coincident with Dr. Straub's resignation as professor of Greek. He has been a member of the faculty of the university for 52 years. He will retain his office at the university.

2000 DEAD IN PERSIAN VILLAGE AFTER QUAKE

TEHERAN, Persia, May 9.—(AP)—The newspaper Iran said today that there was an earthquake at Saimang. Most of the buildings in the town collapsed during a second shock.

Exact number of casualties is not stated but Iran repeats other newspapers' estimates of 2000 dead.

WARN JAP FARMER TO FIRE FILIPINOS

SEATTLE, May 9.—(AP)—The next move in the uprisings against Filipinos by white workers in western Washington was awaited today by sheriff's officers, following information last night that a Japanese vegetable grower near Auburn, 21 miles south of here, had been warned that unless he released his Filipino laborers within 24 hours "the place would be burned."

TEXACO AVIATION REPRESENTATIVE PRAISES AIRPORT

Larry Cooper, Texaco's aviation representative for the Pacific coast, with headquarters in Los Angeles, landed at Medford's airport this forenoon on his Spartan biplane C-3 in order to complete arrangements for establishing a Texaco station on the local field.

Flying his Spartan plane with its Wright J-6 motor, Cooper made the run from Tulsa, Okla., to Los Angeles, Cal., on this trip in one day covering a distance of approximately 1400 miles.

This is young Cooper's second visit to Medford, the first being when he landed here in November with the Great Lakes speed wing job, which is well known for its stunting and speeding ability.

Mr. Cooper has a record of more than 4200 hours of solo flight service, much of which was with the U. S. navy during the world war.

Medford's airport is a credit not only to Medford but the entire state and the Pacific coast. Pilot Cooper stated today. When the Texaco station is erected at the local field it will complete a chain of stations throughout the United States at interval distances of 200 miles.

Mr. Cooper was met at the field this morning by Ed Vallier, manager of the Texaco company in this territory. The visiting aviator will leave here Saturday morning for Portland, Seattle and other northern cities.
