TEXAS MOB PLAYED BY EXECUTIVE

Action of Sherman Citizens in Burning Court House to Slay Negro Called Slander and Libel On People of State.

AUSTIN, Texas, May 10.—(AP)—Describing the action of the mob at Sherman as "a slander and libel on the people of Texas," Governor Dan Moody today issued a statement in which he declared that every power of the state would be brought to bear to seek out and punish the persons responsible for the rioting.

He termed the action of the mob in firing on soldiers as treasonable. "The action of this mob in undertaking to set aside the laws of the country and making it self a group of murderers and incendiaries by burning the court-house and killing the negro is unpardonable. It is an evil day when any group of persons combines to override constituted law and authority and add to the crime of murder and arson the offense of firing on soldiers of their state and country."

Reckless Crime. "The wanton destruction of property by this mob was crime in its most reckless fashion. The burning of the courthouse is arson just as much as setting fire to a neighbor's house. I hope the officers find the persons who set fire to the court house and who were leaders of the mob. All state officers at my command will be sent to send these persons to the penitentiary where they belong. It is understood from news dispatched that soldiers were fired upon by the mob. These men were in Sherman as an organized body of soldiers, representing constituted authority and wearing the uniform of the United States army, and action of the mob in firing on them was treasonable. If the identity of the men who made the assault can be ascertained, every power in the state will be utilized in meting out a just punishment to them."

CHORE BOY FACES MURDER CHARGE

VANCOUVER, Wash., May 10.—(AP)—A formal charge of first degree murder was today filed against Clifford Campbell, 15, who confessed he killed Mr. and Mrs. Benjamin Northrup of Helson by exploding a box of dynamite under their house while they were asleep. Campbell was employed as a chore boy on the Northrup farm. In a statement to officers he said he exploded the blast because he was afraid the Northrups were going to discharge him.

R. L. Clarke of Medford Has \$3 Bill Dated 1776

A bit of currency over 150 years old, dating back to 1776, is in the possession of R. L. Clarke, who brought the currency to the Chamber of Commerce yesterday afternoon, after reading an Associated Press dispatch from Auburn, Neb., that a person possessed a similar piece of currency there. The paper owned by Mr. Clarke was issued for three dollars, and has been in the family over 40 years. Signed by John Shaw and H. Johnson, the following writing appears on the bill: "This bill entitles the bearer to receive three Spanish milled dollars or the value thereof in gold or silver, according to an act of Congress at Philadelphia, February 17, 1776."

GUARDS QUELL TERROR REIGN IN TEXAS TOWN

Mob Dispersed After Burning Court House and Negro Homes to Avenge Attack By Black.

SHERMAN, Texas, May 10.—(AP)—A reign of terror by a raging mob which burned and wrecked three blocks of negro buildings, after killing a negro who had attacked a white woman, was ended here today with the arrival of 300 additional national guardsmen who promptly arrested 12 alleged leaders of the riot.

The troops, commanded by Col. Lawrence E. McGee and Col. L. S. Davidson, arrived shortly after 2 a. m. More than 50 out-of-town police officers and rangers under command of Capt. Frank Hammer and M. T. (Lone Wolf) Gonzales assisting the guardsmen.

CIVILIANS HURT IN BOMBING OF CHINESE TOWN

PEIPING, China, May 10.—(AP)—Forty-seven civilians have been killed in Chengchow, and many others injured during an aerial bombardment of northern troops by government forces. Several buildings were destroyed. Hostilities are continuing along a 70-mile front near the Lungchai railway.

Lynching Bee Blackest Mark on Record Texas Educational Center

SHERMAN, Tex., May 10.—(AP)—The death of George Hughes, 41, negro, confessed attacker of a white woman, at the hands of a mob, is the blackest mark on the pages of the history of a city whose schools, institutions and churches had won for it the appellation, "The Athens of Texas." Sherman gained this name for its fine schools, churches and public buildings. The city boasts two denominational colleges, twenty-seven churches, excellent school buildings, a Y. M. C. A., with 400 members and twelve city parks

SHARES UP AS MARKET IS CALMED

Over Score Issues in Net Gains, 3 to 6 Points — Total Sales Less Than Two Million—Profit Taking Easily Absorbed.

NEW YORK, May 10.—(AP)—Leading shares closed substantially higher after a quiet two-hour session on the Stock Exchange today, in sharp contrast to a week ago, when prices went plunging in the largest volume of trading ever recorded on a Saturday.

Renewed speculation for the rise was stimulated by the resistance to selling in yesterday's market, and the sharp decline in the volume of trading. The market remained a highly professional affair, however, as there was a fairly general tendency to await further testing of the low levels of the first of the week.

Total sales were approximately 1,900,000 shares, as contrasted to more than 4,800,000 shares last Saturday. More than a score of issues showed net gains of 3 to 5 points at the close. Such week-end profit taking as appeared was absorbed at rising prices, and final quotations were generally the best of the day.

Loans Reduced. The Stock Exchange's tabulation showing the ratio of member borrowings to the total market value of all listed shares as of May 1 was published after the close, showing a gain of 6-10 of 1 per cent, which might be regarded as rather unfavorable, were it not for the sharp reduction in loans the past week.

TARIFF CONFEREES ARE IN DEADLOCK

WASHINGTON, May 10.—(AP)—The congressional tariff conferees locked horns today over the disputed export debenture and flexible provisions—and found no way out of their differences. Members for the senate refused to yield to a demand from the house group that they ask the senate to relieve them of the pledge they made not to recede on the two propositions.

With that, the conference—which has settled practically all the hundreds of other differences between the senate and house bills, adjourned subject to call by Chairman Smoot.

TWO STUDENTS LOSE LIVES IN PATH OF TRAIN

Auto Crushed by Southern Pacific Engine at Shedd, Ore., Crossing — Three others Injured.

SHEDD, Ore., May 10.—(AP)—An investigation of the collision between an automobile and a Southern Pacific train which claimed the lives of two school students last night and injured three other persons seriously, started here today.

Albert Poland, 14, and Keith Mallow, 18, are dead and Esther Mallow, sister of Mallow, and Frances Farwell and Mrs. Holly Michael were in an Albany, Ore., hospital. Miss Mallow was not expected to live. All resided in Shedd.

TILE AND BRICK PLANT MOVING TO LOCAL SITE

The Standard Products company has sold a large block of its stock to the Willamette Art Tile company and the plant at Eugene will now be moved to Medford, the future home of the company. After looking over the field carefully with Henry Callaghan of the Standard Products company, officials found all the natural rock here in the Toogue River valley in abundance, with which to make tile and brick.

When at Eugene the raw material had to be shipped in, some of it costing \$25 per ton. The process is patented and the company has the only machines in the United States using rock for tile and brick. A \$1000 contract is now under way for tile in the home of Eugene Dow on South Park street, which home will be thrown open to the public as soon as it is finished. The tile is made in all colors, and is as cheap as oak for floors. The plant will be in operation in about three weeks.

PROWLER IN OFFICE OF H. JOHNSON

Capitol Quarters Ransacked and Private Letters Scanned By Night Visitor — Nothing Taken — Other Offices Recently Entered

WASHINGTON, May 10.—(AP)—The office of Senator Johnson, Republican of California, in the capitol building, was ransacked last night and the files of his personal correspondence rifled. Every desk, cabinet and letter file was broken into.

Capitol and city police began an investigation of the case, the fourth of its kind recently. Aroused, Senator Johnson said: "The evidence is conclusive that my private and personal correspondence was sought and read." So far as Senator Johnson could learn at first, nothing was taken from his office.

Detectives found several marks they said indicated the marauder wore gloves. "The senator observed today as he picked up personal letters, which had been extracted from files and left lying outside that 'somebody's ears are tingling if those were read.'" After examination, capitol officials reported the cleaner of the rooms was in the office at 12:30 a. m., and everything was in order.

Senator Johnson's office is on the main floor in the central part of the capitol structure, a place usually closely guarded. Only recently Senator McKellar, Democrat, Tennessee, reported to the senate his office had been ransacked. Senators Smoot, Republican, Utah and Brook, Democrat, Tennessee, reported similarly.

PORTLAND CENSUS UNDER 300,000 IS INITIAL ESTIMATE

PORTLAND, Ore., May 10.—(AP)—Mr. George T. Gerlinger, census supervisor, announced today that "preliminary" figures give Portland a population of 299,122. She said her office has until May 30 to complete its check and that other names will be added. Mrs. Gerlinger said she would make formal report to Washington, D. C., on the basis of her present figures, and that additions would be added there. The 1930 population represents an increase of 15.8 over 1920 when the population was 258,288.

SEATTLE, Wash., May 10.—(AP)—Vernon Withuhn, Seattle, today was preparing for a trip to Washington, D. C., to take part in the national oratorical contest finals May 24, and then travel in Europe for three months, following his victory in the Pacific coast finals here last night.

Withuhn spoke on "John Marshall and the Federal Constitution" in winning first place, outlining Marshall's accomplishments while chief justice of the supreme court, and pointing out that the supreme court of today is based on many of Marshall's rulings.

INVITE HOOVER VISIT LAKE ON TOUR OF PARKS

PORTLAND, Ore., May 10.—(AP)—A "cordial and hopeful" invitation to President Hoover to extend his tour of national parks of the west this summer to include Crater Lake and Rainier national parks in Oregon and Washington was expressed today by the Portland chamber of commerce in a telegram sent Senator McNary by the Portland chamber of commerce.

DEATH TOLL INCREASING IN STORMS

Oklahoma and Texas Report 86 Dead During Past Week—Many Homes Are Crushed By Force of Twisters.

OKLAHOMA CITY, May 10.—(AP)—The death toll from tornadoes in Oklahoma and Texas during the past week today had mounted to 86, with the addition of four deaths reported from a series of twisters that swept thru eastern Oklahoma, leaving paths of destruction through more than half a dozen communities.

Mrs. Gladys Downs, 21, was killed yesterday when a tornado tossed her home 150 yards over a hill and smashed it on the ground. Her husband, who also was in the house, was not injured seriously.

A tornado, which first struck near Kinta, and then swept northward through San Bois, Rockford, Eureka, Blaine, close to Stigler, and then lifted at the Arkansas river north of Keotah, took the lives of three more persons.

Jim Chappel, 24, who had been ill for several days, was in such a dangerous condition that he could not be taken to the family storm cellar when the tornado roared down on the Chappel home in Eureka community. Sending the rest of the family into the cave, John Chappel, 71, the youth's father, refused to desert his son, and sat by the sickbed while the home was demolished.

Woman Killed. Mrs. "Slim" Hodges, who lived at the Chappel home, also refused to leave the house and perished with the two men. Their bodies were found 75 yards from where the home formerly stood.

Several persons also were reported injured in the Bartlesville area, but only one man had been taken to a hospital, hours after the storm had struck.

Seven persons were injured, one seriously, near McAlester. When a storm struck at Arpaer community, and swept for several miles across Pittsburg county. A small tornado ripped out a strip of the baseball park fence at Shawnee, but did little additional damage.
