SEATTLE WINS PITCHERS DUEL AGAINST DUCKS

Ortman and Hanson in Close Mound Effort — Seals Edge Up to Leaders By Defeating Stars.

(By the Associated Press) A slugfest and two pitchers' duels featured play in the coast league yesterday which saw the teams in first and second position in the standings defeated, while San Francisco, in third place, edged closer to the top notch by virtue of a 5 to 3 victory over Hollywood at Los Angeles.

The pitchers' duels were fought at Portland, where Seattle defeated the Beaver-Ducks, 3 to 2, making it three straight in the present series. And at Oakland, where a relief hurler held the Sacramento Senators to four scattered hits to give the Acorns a 2 to 1 win.

There was little to choose between Ortman and Hanson, the moundmen respectively for Portland and Seattle. Both allowed seven hits while Hanson collected four strikeouts against Ortman's three. Seattle lunched his, however, and put across the tying run in the fifth and the winning run in the sixth.

Hanson, usually a relief pitcher, went the entire route for the Oaks, while Lauri Vinci, a product of the sand lots, lasted seven innings on the mound for Sacramento.

The Missions and Angels played rugged baseball at San Francisco, the local nine finally emerging from the contest, which saw 35 hits of which 6 were home runs and eleven doubles, on the long end of a 17 to 13 score.

The San Francisco Seals made it four straight over the Hollywood Stars at Los Angeles, defeating the movie city team, 5 to 3.

Grid Star Will Be Coach



WEST POINT, N. Y., May 10.—Christian Keener Cagle, one of Army's greatest football stars, has decided to submit his resignation immediately after his graduation, June 12, from the military academy, in order to accept a coaching position at Mississippi A. and M. He also will work for "a large commercial house."

Cagle's plans were announced by Major Phillip B. Fleming, graduate manager of athletics at the military academy. Because of Cagle's prominence in the athletic world, Major-General William R. Smith authorized the cadet to make a statement in his own behalf.

"It is with considerable regret," Cagle said, "that I shall submit my resignation to the war department after graduation in order to accept a position in civil life, one as football coach at Mississippi A. and M., and the other with a large commercial house. The combined salary is considerably more than the pay of a major-general, a rank which I would indeed be most fortunate to attain after 30 or 35 years of service."

NEGRO CONQUERS WRESTLING SAILOR THINKS YAQUI JOE WILL PROVE EASY

DETROIT, Mich., May 10.—(AP)—For the first time in 29 years a negro reigned today as the welterweight champion of the world. The newly crowned title holder is young Jack Thompson of Oakland, Cal., who conquered Jackie Fields in 15 rounds of fighting in the Olympia arena last night.

Thompson battered Fields from pillar to post, winning so convincingly that Referee Elmer ("Slim") McClelland instantly raised Thompson's right hand aloft in victory when the bell changed ending the contest. Thompson was credited with winning 10 of the 15 rounds, with three going to the defending champion.

REDS FEATURE CLOSE BATTLES IN SENIOR LOOP

Fourth Successive Tight Contest Lost Through Poor Peg to First — Grimes Gets Funny.

Cincinnati engaged in its fourth successive close game yesterday, losing the series opener to Philadelphia, 3 to 1, through one costly error. Joe Stripp's bad throw to first in the second inning proved the way for two Philly outcasts.

Through all the rest of the National league, only one other pitcher went the route. Hal Carlson lasted nine innings. While the Chicago Cubs took first place away from the New York Giants by beating them, 6 to 5.

Brooklyn's Grimes lost his chance to do something for the Boston Braves by being too polite to Umpire Mike Donohue. After protesting several decisions, Grimes found one he liked and his exaggerated thanks earned him a trip to the showers.

Bill Clark of Brooklyn and Jess Petty of Pittsburgh engaged in a fine mound duel for seven innings, but both departed suddenly as each team scored four runs in the eighth.

Lloyd Brown of Washington and Bob Grove of Philadelphia went to the top of the American league pitchers as they each won game number 4 with no defeats. The Senators won, 14 to 3. Grove was effective after his usual bad first inning, and the Athletics took the American league lead by beating Cleveland, 9 to 4.

George Uble fanned eight as Detroit won a 5 to 4 victory and checked all the Yankee sluggers except Earl Combs, who drove in all of New York's runs with a home run and a double.

Danny MacFayley took his turn in combining pitching prowess with Tom Oliver's hitting, to give the Boston Red Sox their third successive victory. He held the St. Louis Browns to six hits for a 5 to 2 triumph while the rookie outfielder made two more hits to make it 15 consecutive games in which he has hit safely.

With a victory over Wildcat Pete of Eugene to his credit, Gob Watkins, ex-navy champion, expects to make short work of Yaqui Joe when the two meet at the Armory next Monday night in a finish match, promoted by Herb Green. Watkins defeated Pete at Salem early this week after a trial match, and, as a rule, Pete in past matches has defeated the Indian.

Yaqui Joe is coming direct to Medford from Texas and expects to wrestle several times in various sections of the state before returning. He has an enviable record of victories, most of which are due to his skill in manipulating flying holds.

TROPH BREAKS WILLING IN TIE 198 "BIRDS" FOR WITH BRITISHER GUN PRACTICE FOR OLD TROPHY

PORTLAND, Ore., May 10.—(AP)—Led by Frank M. Troeh, Portland's internationally known trap-shooter, more than 200 shooters, gathered here for the Northwest Sportsman's association annual tournament, today will shoot off the first 100 targets on the northwest 16-yard bird race and the first 100 birds of the northwest handicap.

Troeh yesterday set a record for the other trigger pullers to shoot at by topping a field of more than 70 first-day gunners in the preliminary 100 16-yard targets which was the opening day feature.

Despite the fact no tallies were at stake, Troeh broke 198 targets. On his first 100 Troeh shattered 75 before he lost two birds on the fourth trip.

R. S. Searle of Seattle captured second honors with 196 of the flying clay birds. H. Shelton of Salem, Ore., was third, F. D. Grewell of Los Angeles placed sixth with 185.

Charles Leith, manager of the Portland Gun club, captured the only title at stake yesterday, the doubles crown, on the 200 16-yard birds, by cracking 99 out of 100, but dropped down to 82 on the second for a total of 191.

Mrs. H. M. Hollyfield led the women shooters, competing in the preliminary 200 with 182. Professional honors went to Rush Raze, shooting salesman of Denver, Colo.

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PREP TRACKSTERS IN QUALIFICATION ROUNDS AT O. S. C.

CORVALLIS, Ore., May 10.—(AP)—Five hundred athletes from 52 high schools of Oregon today participated in the most extensive interscholastic track meet ever held here.

The record-breaking entry list exceeded by fourteen schools and a hundred entrants the lineup for last year.

Preliminary heats were run off this morning. Qualifying rounds were necessitated by the great number of entrants.

Qualifying rounds in the 100-yard dash, the 220 dash, 120 high hurdles and 220-yard low hurdles were scheduled for the morning session, so many athletes had entered in the 220 dash that fifteen preliminary heats were required.

Morning qualifying rounds in the field meet events included shot put, discus, broad jump and javelin.
