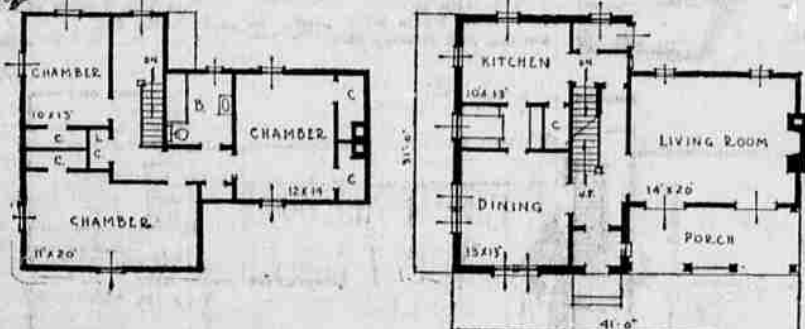
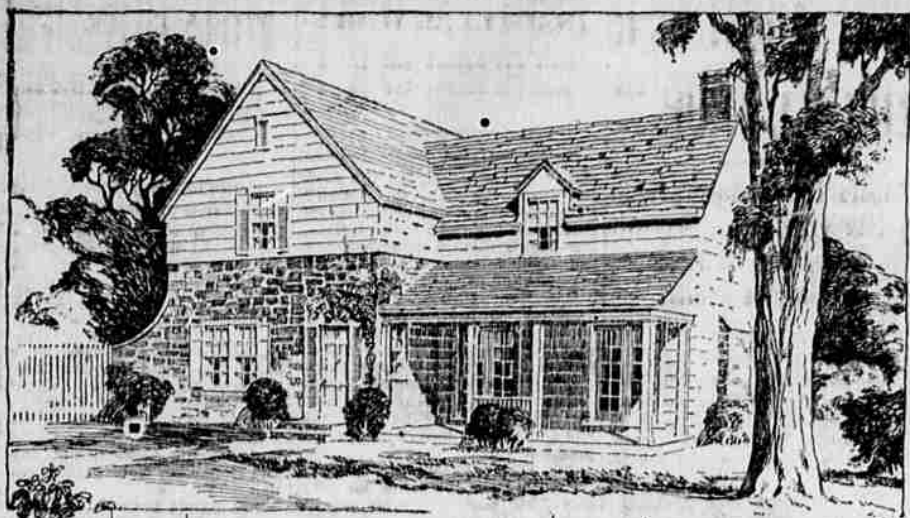


ANOTHER IDEAL HOME PLAN
