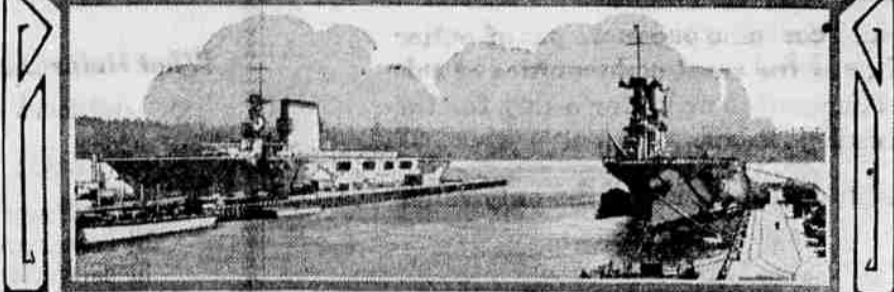
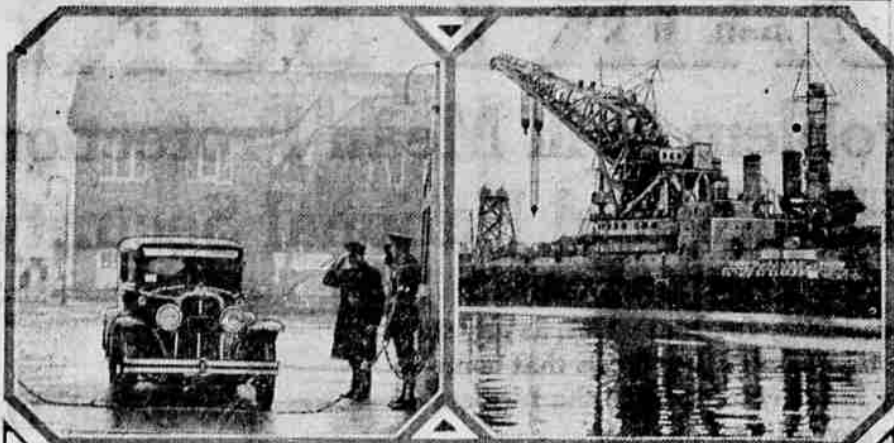

 May 1st, Child Health day, we

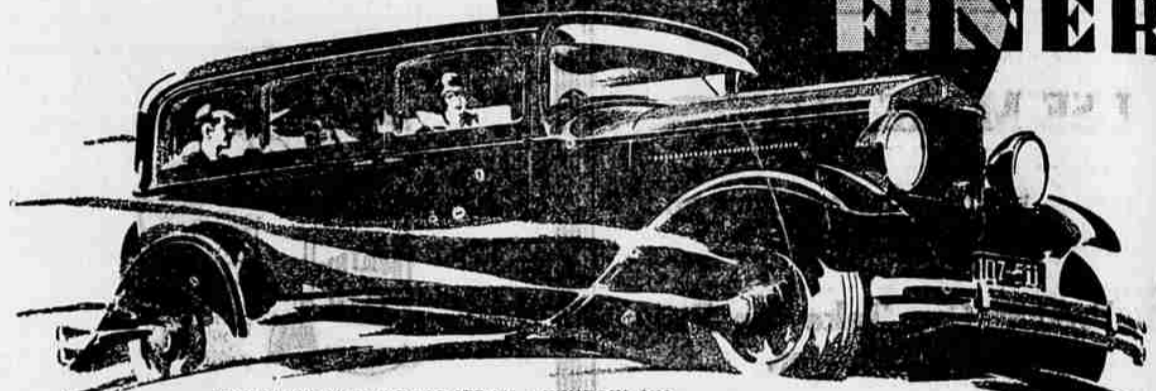
had a short program. We put on two plays—"Proserpine" and the "Treasure Hunt." Several poems were also read.

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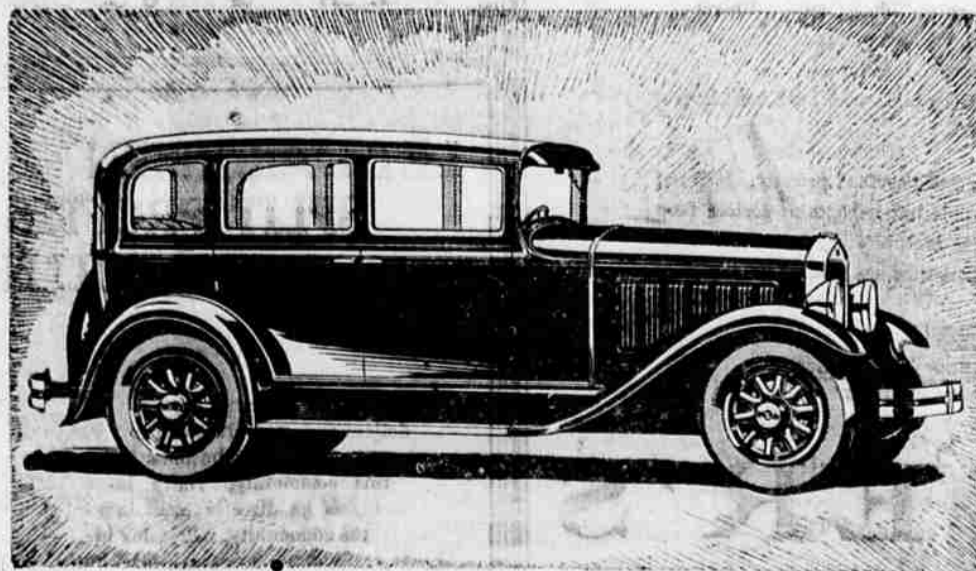
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
