## WILLING BEATS BRITISH STAR BY STEADY PLAY

### Portland Dentist Has Chance to Win St. George's Vase — Gale Raises Havoc With Brilliant Play of Don Moe.

SANDWICH, England, May 10.—(AP)—Dr. O. P. Willing with a rock-like steadiness which has made him a famous figure of the golf links tied with Rex Hartley, young British Walker cup player, at 148 for the 36-hole competition for the prized St. George's vase, and an 18-hole play-off tomorrow will decide the issue.

The Portland, Oregon, dentist thus has another chance to win the trophy he tied for in 1923 when Francis Oulmet, his fellow countryman, defeated him by a stroke in a play-off.

The struggle today marked another phase of the 1929 American offensive against the citadels of British golf but all the Anglo-American battles thus far are but minor engagements compared to the big events coming next week. A score of American girls will be among the 150 starters in the British women's championship at Pormby and the international team play for the Walker cup is booked for Sandwich Thursday and Friday.

Events since the arrival of the visitors indicate the closest sort of competition in the major encounters. Glenna Collett's team of women made an impressive showing against their British women opponents at team play. The British professionals barely fought off a single-handed drive by Horton Smith in the northern professional championship and an American today gained a tie the St. George's stern medal play quest.

The four players from the United States entering the play today for the 42-year-old cup all finished the first round among the half dozen leaders but Don Moe and George Voigt were later betrayed by the treacherous weather.

The channel sun smiled on Moe as he returned a sparkling 71 for the first 18 holes to tie the Hon. Michael Scott, scion of a famous British golfing family, for first place. Then the weather gods stirred the gales and the youth who shot a 71 a few hours before needed 87 to negotiate the course in the afternoon, and probably he learned more of the vagaries of British golf today than he dreamed could be learned.

Willing followed a safe 75 in the morning with a good 73 in the afternoon while Hartley shot 75 in the first round and 72 in the second.

Voigt returned a 72 in the first round but his putter failed him in the second and his best was 78 for a total of 150. Von Elm finished with a score of 153, taking 75 in the morning and 78 in the afternoon. The Detroitier required 25 strokes for the last five holes, including the short 16th in his string of five straight fives.

Moe had a tragic experience in the game, taking an eight at the fourth when he used four shots in a bunker. Dr. Willing brought his great experience into play in the wind and his only serious error of the afternoon was a pushed shot at the short 16th which caused him to take a four for the par hole.

## BEND EAM PLAYS ASHLAND TODAY

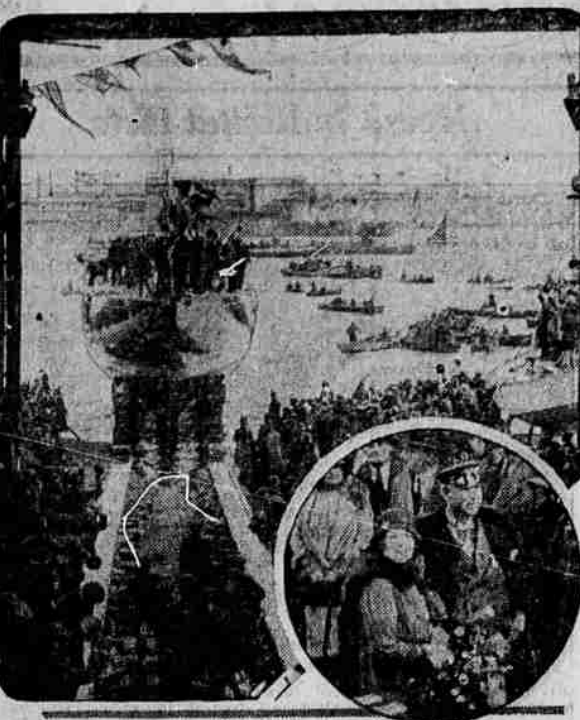

## LAKEVIEW SHOT IS BIG SURPRISE OF PORTLAND SHOOT

PORTLAND, Ore., May 10.—(AP)—M. L. Gilbreath, Lakeview, Ore., a comparatively unknown shooter, today took the lead over gunners competing for the 15-yard target title by breaking 98 for his first half of the 200-bird race, the feature of the annual tournament of the Northwest Sportsmen's association in progress here.

Earl Bauer, Seattle, and Frank Troch and Roy Branton, Portland, were close upon the Lakeview gunner's heels with totals of 97 and there are several scores of 96. Two professional shooters, Rush Razez, Denver, and Earle Troch, Portland, also shot 97.

Earl Bauer, Seattle, took the lead in the Northwest handicap shoot, which also got under way today, by breaking 96 birds from the 22-yard mark. Gilbreath, who also was set down at the 22-yard mark, broke 94. E. Nitschelm, Klamath Falls, and C. W. Wood, Medford, Ore., tied for second place in the handicap shoot by breaking 95 from the 20-yard line.

The tournament will close tomorrow with the final 100 targets in the Northwest championship and handicap.

## WAR DEPARTMENT HAS NO WORD OF CAGLE QUITTING

WASHINGTON, May 10.—(AP)—"A cadet named 'Cagle,' today drew the attention of F. Truce Davidson, acting secretary of war. Davidson, in a 200 word statement, said that the war department knew nothing about the desire of Christian Keener, "Red" Cagle, West Point's football hero, to resign from the army to take up football coaching.

In a prepared statement, Mr. Davidson said: "Press reports have appeared to promulgate an erroneous impression that a cadet named Cagle at the United States military academy would be allowed to resign from the army immediately after his graduation next June. There is no evidence in the war department that such action is contemplated."

Cagle announced yesterday that an offer of a coaching position at Mississippi A. and M. college, with a business opportunity in addition, would give him more responsibility, immediately than is received by a major general.

## ROSE CITY BOWLER WINS GRAND PRIZE

SEATTLE, May 10.—(AP)—The all-events championship—the biggest prize of the northwestern international bowling congress—was awarded tonight to Eddie Capen of Portland who rolled a total score of 1812 in nine games. A foul in the ninth frame of his second game in the doubles tonight cost Harold "Bud" Forbes of Olympia the coveted crown. Working on a pair of strikes Forbes sent his ball down the center of the alley. It hit the pocket for a clean sweep but he stepped a fraction of an inch over the foul line and the strike did not count. He came back to garner a spare in the frame but the ten pins cost him the title for he only lacked four of winning the championship. His brilliant 1809 score gave him second place, the same position he won in the 1929 tournament in Vancouver, B. C.

## GRANT HIGH WINS TRACK TITLE, WITH PENDLETON NEXT

CORVALLIS, Ore., May 10.—(AP) Grant high school, Portland, replaced Franklin as state track champion by scoring 42 points in the interscholastic track and field meet held on the Oregon State college field this afternoon. It was the largest high school athletic meet ever held in the state. Pendleton finished second with 30 points, Franklin placed third with 19. Corvallis was fourth with 11.5 points, while Lincoln and Baker high schools scored each 10 points. Thirteen of the 47 others entered placed in the point column.

Three new meet records fell and another was tied, while two state records, one of five years standing, were bettered when Joslin of Baker put the shot 49 feet 6 inches and Demaris, of Prineville, broke his own record in the javelin with a heave of 136 feet 12 inches.

High point honors were divided four ways when Fyock, of Franklin, Twitcheil, of Grant, Joslin, of Baker, and Artburn, of Pendleton, scored each 10 points.

## STRANGLER SIGNS TO GRAPPLE GUS

## NAVY CREWS DIM SYRACUSE HOPES

ANNAPOLIS, May 10.—(AP)—The Navy swept the seven clean late today at the expense of Syracuse University, winning the varsity, junior varsity and Plebe freshmen events of a dual regatta.

With a new stroke, Howard Shelton, an 133-pounder, showing the way, the naval academy edged all the way in the varsity event, winning by a length and three-quarters, and registering time of seven minutes, 12 seconds for the tenley distance, a mile and five sixteenths. The Orange time was six seconds slower.

The outcome was a setback for the hopes of the veteran Teneyek, of Syracuse, as he had placed confidence in the ability of his eight, which last June, as yearlings, won the intercollegiate freshman championship at Poughkeepsie; for the Navy, it rebuilt confidence that suffered from the bare defeat by Columbia April 26.
