

19 Thoroughbreds Entered For Kentucky Derby Test

EXPECT SOME MAY WITHDRAW BEFORE BUGLE

Rail Birds Will Scan Entries in 'Derby Trial' Today for Dope On Saturday's Race Classic.

LOUISVILLE, Ky., May 13.—(AP) With the Kentucky Derby only four days off, speculation today centered on the number of thoroughbreds that would go to the post when the bugle sounds "boots and saddles" for the fifth race at Churchill Downs Saturday.

The \$50,000 added mile-and-a-quarter speed and endurance test this year is not expected to have a record field. Nineteen horses, all colts, were listed today among the probable starters, with likelihood that several would be withdrawn before Saturday, bringing the number to accept the issue down to 15 or less.

Nine derby eligibles will compete in the fifth race at the Downs. The race, dubbed "the Derby trial," is for three-year-olds at the middle distance, and will give the dopers a line on who has the best chance to defeat the derby favorite, Gallant Fox, winner of the freakish at Pimlico last Friday.

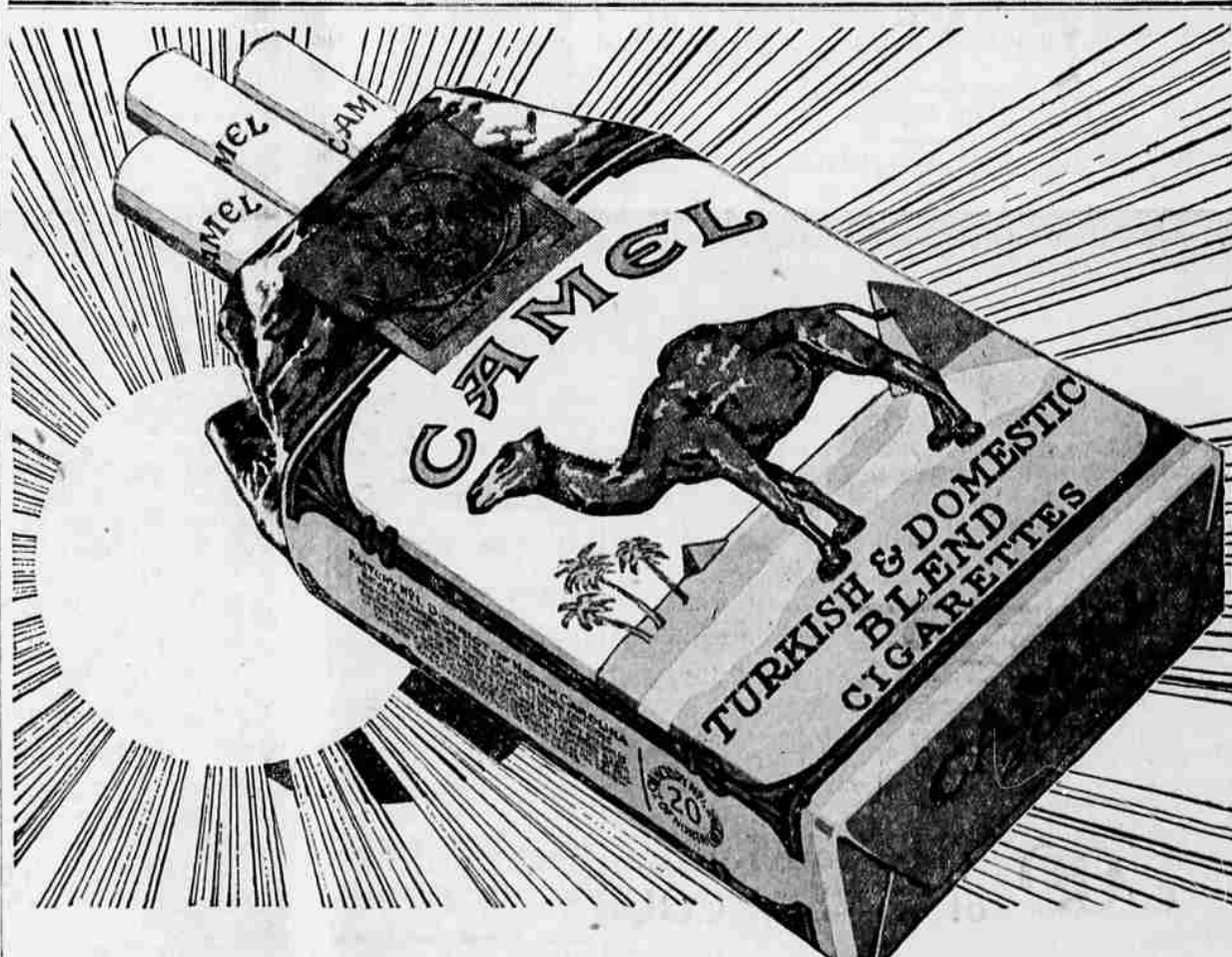
