BIG INCREASE OF FORDS IN 1930

DETROIT, May 14. — Complete figures on the registration of automobiles in the United States in the first quarter of the year show that 49.8 per cent of the new passenger cars and 45 per cent of the new commercial units registered were Fords. There were 696,543 new passenger cars of all makes registered, and of these 282,154 were Fords. This is an increase of 15,833 in the number of Fords registered compared with the corresponding period of last year. The total registration of new commercial units was 104,315. Of these 46,995 were Fords, compared with 44,583 in the first quarter of last year.

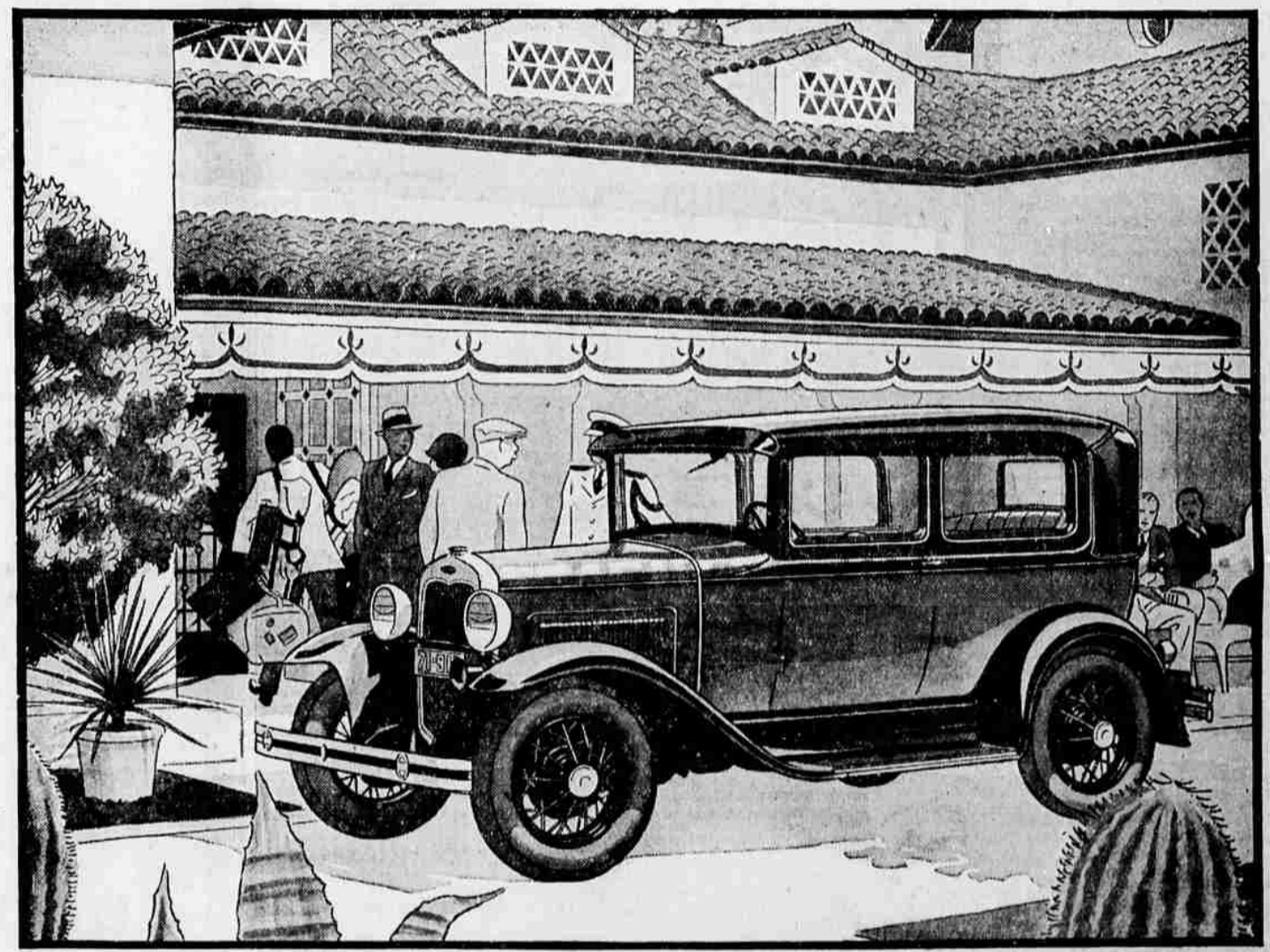
