ROAD CONTRACTOR SUES UNDER NEW OREGON STATUTE

SALEM, Ore., May 14.—(AP)—In the first case to be tried in Oregon under the declaratory judgments act of the 1925 legislature, Judge Louis P. Hewitt of the circuit court for Multnomah county yesterday passed upon the liability of the state high commission relative to four damage claims made by Guy K. Atkinson, a contractor.

The total amount of the claims was about \$54,000; in two of the claims the court held that the state is not liable. In two others it held that the state is liable if the contractor can prove damages.

To determine whether he was damaged these two claims will go before a board of arbitration, agreed to by the litigants when the claims were presented in court.

The court was not concerned with adjustment of the alleged damages, the only question before it being that of liability. The controversy grew out of a contract in Tillamook county.

WILL G. STEEL URGES VOTERS TO SUPPORT CORBETT

To the Editor: Under the Oregon system it is hard to get men of means, who are more than usually competent to direct public affairs, to give up private life for the public good and accept office, whereas, cheap adventurers, who want notoriety with a salary beyond that which they are competent to earn in private life, rush into the arena, abuse everybody who has held the office they covet and shout how they will liberate the poor citizens of an unfortunate state.

At rare intervals a man of wealth, who has shown his ability as a director of important affairs, reluctantly announces his candidacy for an office, but, because he is not a demagogue, which means a politician, people often reject him and vote for the fellow who shouts the loudest, then repeat, but next time they do the same thing once and wonder why taxpayers are so high.

Such is the present condition. Demagogues are in the field, but not all are such. Harry Corbett represents the best type of American citizenship and is neither a high brow nor an adventurer. I know him, knew both his parents and his grandparents. He was born in Oregon, has lived here all his life and has the confidence of all with whom he has had dealings, because he treats their affairs as his own would treat his own, that is, with marked ability and good fellowship. He would prefer to lose the governorship than to win it by crooked politics. If elected, as I hope he will be, he will be a credit to the state and beloved of its citizens, regardless of political convictions.

The construction of the court house will not cost you one penny in taxes, if the court house is built while this fund is available. If construction were to be postponed, and the \$260,000 used for other purposes, taxes would have to be levied and the construction would have to be paid for out of your pocket.
