

NOTIFY AUTOISTS LICENSE FEE DUE ON FIRST OF JULY

SALEM, Ore., May 15.—(AP)—Nearly 300,000 application forms for motor vehicle licenses are being placed in the mail this week by the secretary of state, preparatory to the annual registration, which, for the first time, will be due July 1. The 1929 legislature changed the date from January 1. The new license plates will be black with orange numerals and letters. With the exception of trucks operating under the motor transportation act, passenger cars and trucks will carry the same kind of plates. Trucks operating under the transportation act will be indicated by the letter "M" before the numerals.

OKLAHOMA BROTHERS BATTLE WITH COPS

DUNCAN, Okla., May 15.—(AP)—Police today sought Jeff Cunningham, the aftermath of a gun battle near here last night in which one of Cunningham's brothers was killed, and two other brothers and two officers wounded. A group of officers, seeking two men who earlier had committed a robbery, halted an automobile they said was occupied by the brothers at Marlow Junction, near Duncan. Occupants of the automobile fled at their approach.

WOMAN'S WEAPON USED IN MURDER OF WIFE

PORTLAND, Maine, May 15.—(AP)—Kenneth Williams, 29, of Yarmouth, confessed today to the county attorney that he murdered his wife with a rolling pin. She was found dead in the barn of Ernest R. Smith, a neighbor, on April 4, and was believed to have been the victim of an accidental fall downstairs.

SALEM, Ore., May 15.—(AP)—Anyone wishing a deserving boy to raise may make a selection from a number of lads at the state training school, whom the school wishes to place in good homes. Parole officers of the school said today that about 29 youngsters are available. They are not "bad boys," as the public sometimes thinks of the lads at the school—anyway, the school officers say they are not. On the other hand, say the authorities, the boys are in school because they have been more sinned against than sinning, and need that which they have never had before—good homes. The boys are said to be reliable and eager to make good.

FLOOD SWEEPS CHILD FROM MOTHER'S ARMS

FORT WORTH, Texas, May 14.—(AP)—Junior McDermitt, 7, son of Mr. and Mrs. C. E. McDermitt, was drowned last night when he was swept from the arms of his mother as she was trying to carry him to safety after the family had abandoned their home, near Sycamore creek, which was swollen by heavy rains. The body has not been recovered.

AIR-BUS SERVICE FOR BAY PASSENGERS SOON

SAN FRANCISCO, May 15.—(AP)—Pacific grayhound stage lines and Air Ferries, Ltd., today announced through air-bus service on the stage operating out of Vallejo. The amphibian terminal link will save two hours in some schedules. Lines to Portland, Salt Lake, Reno and numerous northern California points will be affected. Service will be inaugurated tomorrow. AUTO OWNERS IN STATE CARELESS

SALEM, Ore., May 14.—(AP)—Too many Oregon automobile owners carelessly lose their auto registration receipts, says Secretary of State Hal E. Ross, and thereby breed a lot of bad luck for themselves. This caused the secretary's office today to issue a statement stressing the importance of keeping the receipt. "The receipt is not just a slip of paper to be ignored," says the secretary, "or a mere receipt for the money to be placed in a file of bills, for it has a vital purpose—the identification of the automobile for which it is issued. It is the motorist's evidence of registration and ownership and is extremely valuable to him."

PAUL KELTY RETURNS TO OREGONIAN STAFF

EUGENE, Ore., May 15.—(AP)—R. G. Callvert, managing editor of the Morning Oregonian, announced today that Paul Kelly, formerly managing editor of the Eugene Register, had accepted a position on the editorial staff of the Oregonian, effective June 1. Kelly has been connected with Eugene newspapers for the past seven years, and formerly was employed by the Oregonian.

TONSILS TAKEN WITH GERMY TOOLS, CLAIM

PORTLAND, May 15.—(AP)—Rollin Huddleston today filed suit for \$42,153 against Dr. W. T. Physician, charging that the physician used improperly disinfected surgical instruments in performing a tonsil operation for him, and that his throat became infected to such an extent that he has become a permanent hospital patient.

ROUNDUP OF DOGS TO SAVE WOOLIES

THE DALLES, Ore., May 15.—(AP)—A sequel to recent raids by marauding dogs on sheep flocks south of the city came today with announcement by the Wasco county court that a concerted drive will be made to collect state dog taxes. Sheep, some of them costly pedigreed rams, to the value of nearly \$1000 have been killed recently and the claims of owners who have suffered damage exceed the revenue raised from dog taxes. To date 106 licenses have been issued. Records of the tax assessor show 353 dogs owned.
