LIVESTOCK AND GRAIN FREIGHT RATES PENDING

Intrastate Decisions to Be Given During Summer—New Policy Rural Extension of Utilities.

SALFEM, Ore., May 15.—(AP)—Among important pending orders from the state public service commission are those involving intrastate freight rates on grain and livestock, both of which will probably be handed down this summer.

The question of intrastate rates on Oregon railroads for livestock shipments was given a hearing some years ago in connection with an interstate commerce commission hearing. The grain rate case was heard in 1925 and 1926, and reductions ordered, but the carriers appealed to the courts, the state commission being upheld. A final order now awaits action by the interstate commerce commission.

Another order that awaits action by the I. C. C. involves terminal switching rates in Portland. The I. C. C. order will affect switching charges at Seattle, Tacoma, Spokane and Portland.

Within a few days the state commission expects to hand down an order adopting a new policy covering extensions of utilities into rural communities, and another adopting new motor freight classifications.

BANCROFT ROUGH BUT ROMANTIC IN CURRENT TALKER

With its mixture of tensely dramatic scenes and others that are laughable, a good plot, clever and forceful dialogue, and excellent supporting cast, despite its somewhat ominous sounding title, "Ladies Love Brutes," George Bancroft's new talking film drama is an interesting production—one of those kind which keeps the audience in gripping tension till the thrilling climax comes. This picture began its engagement at the Fox Criterion theater yesterday.

An amusing "Our Gang" comedy with some new juvenile faces, but with little Wheeler, black Farino and Mary Ann Jackson still members of the cast, a Fox Movietone news review and the moving picture scenes of Medford and the valley round out the remainder of the entertainment program.

"Ladies Love Brutes," impressed yesterday's audiences as one of Bancroft's best pictures, in affording that portrayal of strong man type roles a perfect vehicle in which to display his two-fisted tactics, blunt honesty and never swerving nerve, mixed with the tender and lovable side which always accompanies that kind of role.

While superb in his boisterousness and burly ruthlessness, Bancroft never before appeared to such advantage as in his quieter love scenes in full dress garb, and in his scenes with his own son and the boy of the woman he loves. His acting was more subdued and had an exquisite poise which fitted in perfectly with his resonant voice and physical appearance.

Pretty Mary Astor, always conspicuous in her refinement of personal appearance and acting, and Frederick March, that portrayal of natural, manly roles, as the separated wealthy society couple, played the leads. The falling in love of the wife and Bancroft, the latter as the rich roughneck steel work contractor longing to break into society, furnished the main part of the plot, and the intense love scenes between them furnish some clever acting.

Other leading parts are taken by Stanley Fish, as the hard-boiled racketeer gangster who loves blackmail tribute on the building trades; David Durand and Freddie Burke, Frederick, child actors, and Claud McAllister, that comedian of the silly all-teeth showing smile, effeminate voice, as the English-bred society tailor, Crawford Kent, Ferike Boros, E. H. Calvert, Margaret Quinby and Lawford Davidson appear in other roles.

Why try to deceive voters with false statements? The Washington school site has never been offered as a courthouse site for \$23,000.00 or any other amount. If you doubt this go to the office of the city superintendent of schools and examine the records.

Washington school is a going school and can not be sold, except by vote of the people of School District No. 49. The school directors may make a tentative price, but the voters will have to accept or reject that price.

Nor did the Medford city council ever fix a price of \$26,500.00 on the Armory site. No price of any amount was ever even suggested on this property. Call the city recorder of Medford and verify this statement.

The City of Medford owns the Armory site, with the exception of five lots, which can be acquired for less than \$10,000. The city council know this, and the county court should know it.

An absolute guaranty can be made for the conveyance of the Armory site for a courthouse location for a sum not exceeding \$10,000.00.

Neither did the people of Medford ever agree to furnish any site the county court might select. They voted only

"to donate a site for a permanent county seat." Do you doubt this assertion? Here is the exact wording of the amendment the people of Medford voted at a special election October 8, 1925:

"An act to amend the charter of the City of Medford, Oregon, by adding thereto a new section to be known as Section 72d authorizing the City Council to create further bond indebtedness to build a new city hall; authorizing the City Council to lease same to the county for a temporary courthouse; authorizing the City Council to sell the present city hall building, and authorizing the City Council to donate a site for a permanent county seat."

This is all the agreement the people of Medford ever made with the county court — To donate a site for a permanent county seat. Do you see anything in that authorizing the city to buy the Washington school property? At that time, as at present, the city owned over nine hundred vacant lots, many clustered in blocks, and it was well understood between the city council and the county court that a site was to be chosen from what the city then had. As a matter of fact the Armory site was then tentatively chosen. This can be proven, too.

Who hatched up this stuff about "the people keeping faith with the county court?" Why not the county court keep faith with the people of Medford? Why drag Medford further into the maelstrom of bonded debt? Why disrupt our schools?

Why publish lies to promote promoters and further the Pipe Dream of a civic center?

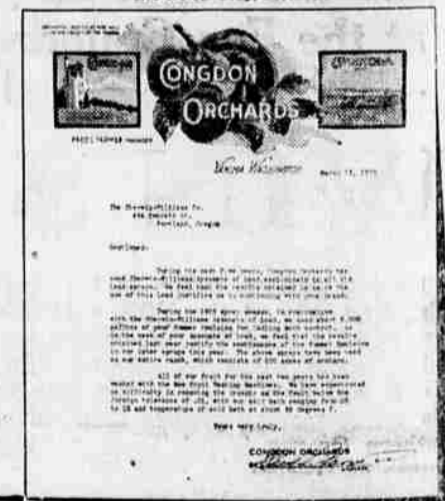
