Claims Article Unsigned

Your paper last evening, and the morning paper, carried an unsigned communication, in violation of the corrupt practices act, in which they sought to prejudice the Army site by many gross misrepresentations. Take for instance the statement about the tax titles. This is a vicious untruth which the anonymous scuffer of the corrupt practice law should have, or could have known, by an inquiry at the city treasurer's office. All of those lots are covered by quit claim deeds to the city from the owners.

This practice of the city in bolstering up its titles by quit claim deeds is a matter of common knowledge. Your paper has heretofore maintained a very decent attitude in the matter of anonymous writings and I feel quite certain that this anonymous statement given such favorable front page space must have escaped your attention.

Section 4144, O. L., controls the printing of such matter and also covers the unsigned advertisements published by the proponents of the Washington site, who have also been violating the law in hiding behind an alias.

I can not believe that this sort of propaganda, covered on a page in a daily newspaper, can ultimately prevail.
