

Business Women Gather in Medford For Annual Conclave

OPEN 3 DAY CONVENTION ON FRIDAY

Registration Headquarters at Hotel Medford—Grants Pass Joint Hostess—Ashland Luncheon Will Open Big Program.

The tenth annual convention of the Oregon Federation of Business and Professional Women's clubs will open in Medford at 11 o'clock tomorrow morning, following arrival in this city of delegates from all leading cities of the state as well as visitors from other sections of the United States.

Headquarters for registration will be at Hotel Medford, where the registration committee, headed by Mrs. Belva Aiken, will greet all convention delegates and visitors and give them assignments and programs.

Arrangements have been made for providing the visitors with an opportunity to cast their votes in the primary election.

The Grants Pass club will join the Medford club in acting as hostesses for the convention and a varied program has been completed under the leadership of Mrs. Maud Chapman, president of the Medford club, working with her committees and the Grants Pass president. The program will not be restricted to the Medford city limits. A luncheon at the Lithia Springs hotel in Ashland is included in the first day's schedule.

Southern Pacific busses will leave Hotel Medford for Ashland via the scenic route, at 11:30 a. m. All delegates and members not on the executive council, which will be in meeting at this hour, are expected to make the trip to Ashland.

There is not a Business and Professional Women's club in Ashland at this time, but an effort will be made this week end to promote such an organization, and invitations have been sent to all business and professional women of that city to join the club members at luncheon at the Lithia Springs hotel.

Convene at 2:30. Miss Cecelia Beyer will call the main convention meeting together in the lodge room at the Elks temple at 2:30 o'clock Friday afternoon.

Miss Marion McClench, national president of the Federation of Business and Professional Women's clubs, whose visit here has been anticipated for many weeks, will arrive for the banquet at Hotel Medford and deliver the main address of the evening. Miss McClench makes her home in Ann Arbor, Mich., and the Oregon clubs feel exceptionally fortunate in being able to have her with them for this convention.

The leading event of Saturday will be the presentation of the Three Arts revue, "Two Feet High," at the Junior high school auditorium.

Sunday the convention guests will leave Medford along with members of the local club, for a scenic drive to Grants Pass, where they will attend a breakfast, followed by installation of new officers and a joint meeting of the retiring executive council.

Miss Cecelia Mae Beyer, president of the Oregon Federation of Business and Professional Women's clubs, who will preside at the banquet at Hotel Medford tomorrow evening, is a well known organizer and executive in Portland, where she has spent consid-

erable time, though officially of Astoria, where she is principal of the Captain Robert Gray Junior high school.

Miss Beyer came to Oregon from Utah several years ago. She was born in Ohio, in 1918 she was selected to take over a responsible position in the internal revenue department at Washington, D. C., under President Wilson's administration.

Her former work as a teacher produced an urge so strong that she finally accepted the post of teaching in Olney school, Astoria. During the convention of the National Federation in 1923, she was a conspicuous figure in Portland, when her club entertained the delegates arriving from various parts of the country.

She was president of the Astoria club in that year and was for five consecutive seasons, during which time she put her group among the leaders in the Oregon Federation. Astoria club entertained the federation in 1926 and a record attendance was registered—more than 200 members.

Miss Beyer does not devote all her time to work, but finds sufficient pauses in the day's routine to remain dainty, feminine and charming.

In the legislative program of the federation, she has been most active, and has also taken part in the national legislative program of the group.

Miss Beyer was convention chairman in 1927 for both state and national federation when the latter was held in Oakland, Cal. Oregon received wide notice as the "Beaver State," due to the emblems she originated. This year she has been state membership chairman and organized the clubs in Pendleton and Gresham.

She has supervised music in public schools, conducted junior and senior choirs for many years, and takes an active part in the American Association of University Women, the National Education association, Oregon State Teachers' association and the Young Women's Christian association.
