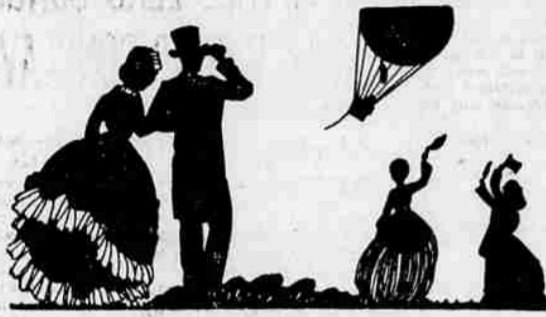

## ELM TREE PESTS SHOULD BE GIVEN ARSENATE SPRAY

The beetles that cause elm trees to lose their leaves during the early summer are now present in elm trees and laying eggs. The young worms coming from those eggs will completely defoliate the tree if a thorough spray program is not carried out. Two seasons of such defoliation will result in killing of the tree by starvation.

Arsenate of lead—four pounds of the powdered material to the 100 gallons of water should be applied within the next two weeks. The young worms feed on the under side of the leaf, therefore the spray should be directed toward that part of the tree.

At a very little cost of money and effort valuable elm shade

troops can be kept free from this destructive pest.
