

# Willing and Moe Aid Yankee Golfers Gain Two Point Lead

## JONES ELATED BY SHOWING OF WALKER SQUAD

Tolley and Wethered Defeat Von Elm and Voight for Lone British Score of Opening Day.

SANDWICH, Eng., May 15.—(AP)—The American Walker cup team today stepped out in front of its British rival to win three of the four foursomes, the first phase of the international golf competition.

Robert T. Jones, Jr., of Atlanta, Ga., and Dr. O. F. Willing of Portland, Ore., defeated T. A. Torrance and Rex Hartley eight up and seven to play.

Donald Moe of Portland, Ore., and Roland MacKenzie of Wilmington, Del., won from Sir Ernest Holderness and J. A. Stout, two up and one to play.

A gallery of 5000 saw the finish of the match which gave Britain its lone victory of the day.

The prince tried to finish the Tolley-Wethered victory but had to fight for a place in the crowd.

Cyril Tolley and Hoger Wethered defeated George Von Elm and George Voigt, two up.

Tolley's sensational play around the greens gave the British the edge.

Britains May Change In the singles matches tomorrow the eight Americans who played the foursome today will compete again, but the British may substitute two of its team.

Bobby Jones, captain of the American team, was elated at the good start for his side, and he would have been satisfied with an even break in the foursomes. However, he was not overconfident.

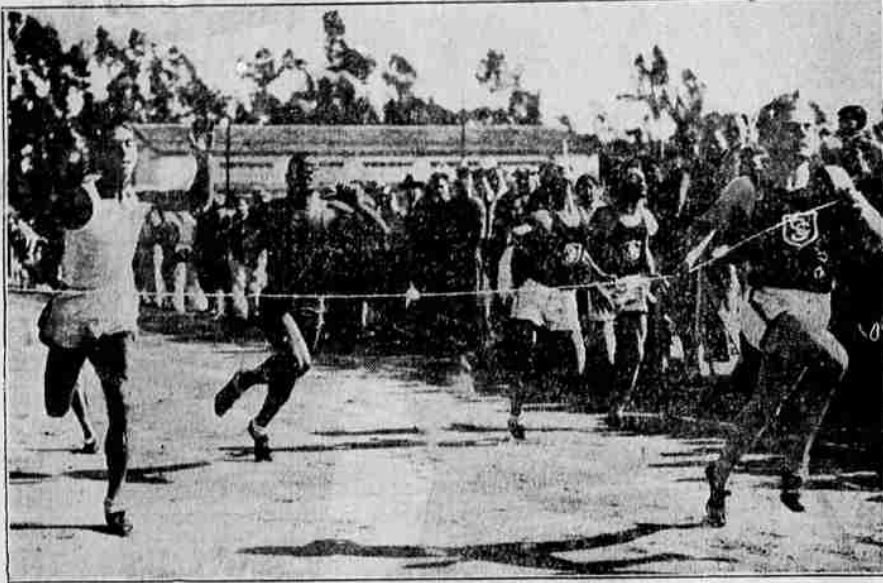
"We may need that advantage tomorrow," he said.

The Americans now need only to win three of the singles and score a half in another to retain possession of the famous cup which never has been won by the British.

## FISH LAKE RESORT CONCESSION GIVEN; WORK WILL START

A new fishing resort development in southern Oregon is in prospect, according to Deputy Game Warden F. M. Brown, as Hoyt Smith has been granted the concession privileges from the federal forest reserve for Fish Lake.

Mr. Smith will immediately rush to completion three cabins, put in a store for sale of supplies and have between 20 and 25 boats on the lake for hire.

According to the terms of his lease he must construct two cabins each year.

It is the intention of Mr. Smith according to report, to turn Fish Lake into a summer camp. He has been caretaker at the lake for the Medford irrigation district for several years.

Fish Lake is one of the most popular fishing grounds, with a natural feed of soft snails and worms for trout. When "they're not biting" anywhere else, the fish are usually mighty agreeable at Fish Lake, according to reports.

With the development of improved roads to the lake, the Fish Lake resort should become one of the most popular in southern Oregon, according to local fishermen.—Ashland Tidings.

## IRA DERN TWIRLS RUSSIAN MATMAN AND WINS MATCH

PORTLAND, Ore., May 15.—(AP)—One of Ira Dern's airplane spins was sufficient for Nick Velocoff, the Russian heavyweight wrestler here last night, and Velocoff decided to call it a night's work. It took the Salt Lake flash just 25 minutes and 10 seconds to turn the trick. The spin followed a vicious headlong crash through the ropes and a ten foot drop to the bare boards of the auditorium which left Velocoff an easy victim for Dern's favorite hold.

As Velocoff made a furious charge at Dern, the latter doubled up to meet the rush and as the Russian hit him, Dern straightened up, raising his opponent in the air and shooting him over the top of the ropes. Velocoff landed on his back on the boards and rolled down into the orchestra pit.

Wright came in exchange for a good pitcher, Jess Petty, and was useless last year because of a bad arm. Luque, a veteran of 14 years with the Cincinnati Reds arrived in exchange for some much younger baseball material.

These two went a long way toward justifying Wilbert Robinson's confidence in them yesterday as they formed an alliance which put the Robins in third place in the National league. Between them they defeated the Cincinnati Reds 7 to 4.

Johnny Frederiek completed the Brooklyn triumph with a homer with two on base in the sixth inning.

With the aid of a lot of rain and cold weather, the Brooklyn victory straightened out the National league standing a trifle. All but two of the games in National league were postponed. As Brooklyn went into third place, Cincinnati dropped into a tie for fifth with the St. Louis Cardinals. Also, victorious for the eighth successive time, came up to take fourth.

The Cardinals moved into the first division by beating the league leading New York Giants yesterday by 7 to 2.

Missions Victim of Ninth Inning Rally — Stars Stop Indians—Zinn Hurls No Hit Game.

Entering the ninth inning the Missions were leading, 2 to 0. Until the seventh the game had been a pitching duel between Ted Pilette and Johnny "Junk" Walington, who pitched, catcher, outfielder, third base and hits with equal skill. The Missions scored once in the seventh and once in the eighth. Then came the fatal ninth. Six hits did the damage, the Beavers crossing the plate five times.

It remained for Hollywood to stop Seattle's spectacular climb. Spotting the Indians four runs in the first inning, the stars proceeded in club out a 13 to 7 victory in a fashion characteristic of their championship behavior last year.
