PANKEY — Jehudiah Pankey died at the Old Soldiers' home in Roseburg, Ore., May 13th, 1930, at the age of 87 years. He was born in Cass county, Illinois, in 1843, and was married to Mary A. Baldwin, January 3, 1867, at Bardonia, Ill. There was born to this union 11 children, six of whom survive.

Mr. Pankey came to the Rogue River valley in 1873, and settled at Central Point. For the past 18 years he has lived at the Soldiers' home in Roseburg. Mr. Pankey spent three years of very active service in the Civil war, serving with company C, 12th Illinois volunteers.

**Wall Street Report**  
NEW YORK, May 16.—(P)—The stock market virtually surrendered itself to speculative apathy today and Wall Street was left to comb the business news and statistical studies for signs of developments that might cause a market awakening. Trading crept forward at a snail's pace, and price changes were largely negligible.

One of the most encouraging statistical analysis was the preliminary index of business activity for April, which, at 92.8, showed a sharp upturn from the 89.5 figure for March.
