AGRONOMIST HERE TO VIEW BULBOSA ON HANLEY RANCH

Prof. Morris Halperin, technical assistant in agronomy at the University of California, Berkeley, arrived in Medford today noon, accompanied by L. B. Sherman, land man of Oakland, for a private unofficial inspection of blue grass, grown in this locality. While here Prof. Halperin will be the guest of Mike Hanley and spend considerable time at the Hanley and Hoover ranch near Medford. Having recently completed an inspection trip through northern California Prof. Halperin said he found in that locality some very interesting plantings. The grass here is now almost ready for harvesting, since it is completely grown during the fall, winter and early spring months.

C. C. Hoover of the Hanley and Hoover ranch returned a few days ago from San Francisco, where he met Mayor Rolph, who placed an order for a trial planting of the newly discovered winter grass. Mayor Rolph, now a candidate for governor of California, is not only a brilliant and successful public executive, but a practical and enthusiastic farmer, as well as interested in the development of all agricultural products. This new forage crop will be planted on his 4000-acre ranch near San Francisco, which according to Mr. Hoover, is an ideal location for the development of this grass.
