## OREGON VICTOR IN HUSKY MEET. NEW MILE TIME

### Hill, Star Racer, Smashes World Record in Thrilling Heat — Result Biggest Upset of Track Season.

EUGENE, Ore., May 17.—(AP)—In one of the greatest upsets of Northwest track history, in which the worlds intercollegiate mile run record was shattered, the University of Oregon defeated the strong University of Washington team here today, 69 1-3 to 61 2-3.

Ralph Hill, star miler of Oregon, with Rufus Kizer, former inter-collegiate champion of the Huskies, at his heels in the final stretch, cut the tape at 4:12 2-5—more than two seconds faster than the record established by John Paul Jones of Cornell, in 1914, when he paced the mile in 4:14 4-5.

Kizer, twice conqueror of Hill in previous meets, took the lead at the start and maintained it until the last 150 yards, when Hill with a great spurt passed the Husky miler and finished nearly six yards in the lead. It was one of the most sensational races ever seen here, and followed on the heels of a first upset, when Tyrrell Lowrey, of Oregon, edged out Washington's speed merchant, Bledsoe, in the 100-yard dash. Lowrey's time was 10.2.

The first two races served to spur on the Ducks. They immediately proceeded to take a first in the quarter mile run, another first and second in the 200-yard dash, a first and second in the half mile, and a first in the two-mile, all events in which Washington was a heavy favorite before the meet.

As expected the Oregon team won the discus, pole vault, and tied for first in the high jump. The Huskies took the broad jump and tied for the high jump. They won the shot put, as expected, and Oregon conceded the mile relay to the Huskies.

Oregon won nine firsts and the teams split in the high jump, with Everts of Oregon and Dunn of Washington each clearing the bar at 6 feet.

Oregon's victory over Washington was its first in more than a decade.

Washington won the freshmen meet from Oregon, 81 to 41. The Huskies took first in all freshman events except the mile, high hurdles, and the javelin.

## MEDFORD SWAMPS MERCHANTS PLAN KLAMATH NETMEN WARM RECEPTION IN RETURN TILTS FOR BEND TODAY

Medford high school's cricket team continued to rule the roost in southern Oregon at the high school courts yesterday when they swamped Klamath Falls high seven matches to nothing. This is the ninth win for the locals out of ten starts. Klamath had to content itself with but two sets out of the sixteen played.

Both Edmiston and Carley, Medford's two ranking players, were forced to go three sets to win from Paddock and Merriman. Slow to start, Paddock, the big tackle on Klamath's football team last fall, dropped his first set to Edmiston 6-9 and then came back to take the second 9-7 after a hard struggle. In the deciding set the local captain got back in his stride and held his opponent to two games.

Tomorrow at the local courts two matches will be played. In the morning starting at ten o'clock the Medford Tennis club will play the Grants Pass Tennis club and in the afternoon at two the local high school will take on the Ashland Normal players.

## SANDE GALLOPS GALLANT FOX TO DERBY VICTORY

Woodward Colt Shows Superiority Over Great Colt In Surging Finish—Crowd Acclaims.

CHURCHILL DOWNS, Louisville, Ky., May 17.—(AP)—Champions every inch of them and every foot of the way, Earl Sande and Gallant Fox proved an unbeatable combination today by galloping through the rain to victory in the fifty-sixth running of the classic Kentucky derby.

"Come on, Sande!" roared the half-drenched crowd of 50,000 as the great jockey took command of the race on the back stretch and opened a good lead.

"Come on, Earl," they shouted again as Sande and Gallant Fox swerved into the home stretch, spraying the closest contenders with mud.

And come on he did with a finish so magnificently convincing as to leave not the slightest doubt that the highly favored eastern combination outclassed the field of track three-year olds.

Gallant Fox successfully fought off the early challenge of the Kentucky pride, Tannery, then beat back the last surging rushes of Gallant Knight, Crack Brigade and Net O.

Won by Two Lengths The heavily played favorite, bearing the colors of William Woodward's Belair stud, New York, won by two good lengths from Gallant Knight of the Audley farm. G. W. Foreman's Ned O finished with a rush a length and a half behind Gallant Knight, with Gone Away fourth, the last money position, and Crack Brigade fifth.

Tannery, a dismal disappointment, finished eighth and for the first time in years, the highly regarded E. R. Bradley entries were nowhere.

Seldom in the history of the Kentucky derby has so great and spontaneous an outburst of popular acclaim greeted a victor as the mud-spattered but smiling and freckled faced Earl Sande, came back to the stands on Gallant Fox.

Earl Gives Trophy While the crowd yelled itself hoarse, the traditional wreath of red roses was draped around the colt's neck and the Earl of Derby, after witnessing his first American race, stepped out to bestow the coveted gold trophy upon William Woodward, vice chairman of the New York Jockey club, and the owner.

Derby and horse racing history was made by this dramatic victory for thoroughbred class and superlative horsemanship.

Sande rode his third derby winner, equalling the record for this ancient classic. Gallant Fox, racing on unbeaten as a three-year old to add the Kentucky classic to triumph in the Rich Preakness, duplicated an accomplishment registered by only Sir Barton in 1919, the black son of Sir Gallant III-Marguerite stamped himself as the champion of his class beyond the slightest doubt.

Georgia Tech, which had one of its poorest football seasons yet fall, has been taking it on the chin all year. The Yellowjackets were beaten by their bitterest rivals, Georgia, in every major sport.

## HIGH GOLF TITLE WON BY EUGENE

SILVERTON, Ore., May 17.—(AP)—The Eugene high school won the state high school golf championship here today. Eugene scored 19 1/2 points to seven for Silverton, the nearest competitor.

Other scores were Park Rose, Portland, 4 1/2; Salem, 2 1/2; Woodburn, 2; Oregon City, 3/2.

This was the first time such an event has been held in Oregon and probably will become an annual affair held at different cities.

When Louisiana State's track and field team lost to Mississippi A. M. it was the Tigers' first conference defeat in seven years.

North Carolina's track and field squad has won its eighth straight state championship. The Tarheels haven't lost a dual meet in eight years.

Marietta College, Ohio, was undefeated in football in the Ohio conference last year.
