REV. CANNON CLEARED ON ALL COUNTS

E. Conference Committee Overrules Accusations of Stock Gambling Thru Buckett Shop—Later Evi- dence Is Promised.

DALLAS, Tex., May 20.—(AP)—By the eyes of his church, Bishop Cannon, D. C., today stood vindicated of all charges of gambling in stocks and of undue political activity in the 1928 presidential campaign.

His campaign against Alfred E. Smith, democratic nominee for president, was vindicated several days ago. Last night the committee on episcopacy of the quadrennial general conference, Methodist Episcopal church, south, cleared the name of blame in the stock market charges.

In cooperation the committee, headed by P. P. Culver, of New York, and comprised of the leading delegates from each conference in the church, overruled the accusations lodged by Judge G. T. H. of Memphis, Tenn., Joseph Daniels of Raleigh, N. C., and a score of other laymen whose names included at least two state supreme court judges.

The three leading figures in the controversy—Cannon, Daniels and Hatcher—today promised to have no say on the matter.

Cannon said he would make a statement, perhaps, when the committee was formally reported at the conference. Daniels, expressing surprise and astonishment that night, was preparing a statement which he said would include a list of the accusations against Cannon, as well as later evidence which the committee had considered because it was not

available when the first accusations were filed.

The accusations centered around Bishop Cannon's admitted transactions with Kable and Company, New York. His accusers stated he knowingly dealt with a "bucket shop."

Not until the committee's decision was announced did it become known that Cannon himself had first requested the investigation in a letter dated May 2, a week before the conference opened.

ODD FELLOWS OF OREGON MEETING

PORTLAND, Ore., May 20.—(AP)—Formal meetings of the grand encampment of the Independent Order of Odd Fellows of Oregon got under way here today with fifteen hundred delegates present from every Oregon county. Many neighboring states.

The Rebekah assembly opened this morning with the seating of the grand officers. This was followed by conferring the assembly degree, the flag ceremony and a tribute to presidents. The regular session was to open at 1:30 p. m. A special session of the grand lodge to confer the grand degree will be held at 4 p. m.

SERUM CAUSE OF 17 BABY DEATHS

LEERBECK, Germany, May 20.—(AP)—The number of infant deaths following anti-tuberculosis inoculation at the Calmette baby asylum here has increased to seventeen.

The ministry of the interior is conferring with the board of health to determine whether the epidemic was due to deterioration of the preparation or caused by a blunder of physicians. The health board seized the serum last week to ascertain whether human tubercular bacilli had entered the serum, which supposedly contained only bacilli from animals.

A trio of Eagle Point boys aged 14, 12, and 12, appeared before county Judge Alex Sparrow of the juvenile court this morning, charged with breaking into a store and taking money from the till thereof. They were accompanied by their mothers, and the defendants, dressed in their Sunday clothes, were meek and said "aie."

The court lectured the youthful offenders and sounded a warning a second appearance would mean the reform school.

The two younger lads were released when they solemnly promised they would come home before dark, and mind their mothers, and go to school, and do what they were told to do, "without kicking."

The 14 year old boy was making a return trip before the court, after being taken to another, several months ago, and was roundly lectured upon the errors of his ways, before given another chance.

FRENCH SOLDIERS LEAVE RHINELAND

MAYENCE, Germany, May 20.—(AP)—Evacuation of the Rhineland by the French army of occupation today entered upon its last phase, with homeward movement of the first of 49,000 troops. Complete evacuation was scheduled before June 30.

In accordance with an order issued by the supreme command of the French army of the Rhineland yesterday, the smaller places were to be freed of military control first. The French war office made it known that Welsbaden, Mayence, and other larger cities, would not be liberated until the very end.

Hoover To Follow Flivver Tourists' Trail In Summer

TYPICAL VACATION AWAITS PRESIDENT IN NATION'S PARKS

WASHINGTON.—(AP) The great American vacation beckons to President Hoover this summer.

Like uncounted thousands of folks from seaboard to seaboard, he is going to "get into the car" and tour the heaped up wonders of nature around which the government has thrown a protecting arm in the national parks system.

Glacier, Yellowstone, Estes, Yosemite and the Grand Canyon are the national parks which the presidential party will tour, in the order named.

The motor cavalcade of clerks, secret service men, photographers and newspaper men, will be part of a summer procession of flivvers and limousines that will carry upward of 2,000,000 tourists. That was the attendance at national parks last year. It is expected to increase this year.

Each of the five national playgrounds the president will visit has a personality of its own, from the richly colored rocks of Glacier, pigmented by the upthrust of a fold in the agony of formation millions of years ago, to the world wonder of the Grand Canyon.

Glacier national park, where the president is expected to spend a week in fishing, is in northwestern Montana, and encloses 981,681 acres. The territory was formed, in some dim time, but the earth cracking under the pressure of tremendous forming forces, resulting in one side thrusting up and overlapping the other.

For grandeur of scenery it is regarded as surpassing the Alps. Its mountains and rocky formations have been colored by natural forces to a magnificent panorama of the chromatic scale. The national parks are enclosed by the governmental limits and lakes almost without number dot the ups and downs of its terrain.

From Glacier the executive party will go to the Yellowstone and Estes parks, and then the president will continue to his home at Palo Alto, Cal. On his return trip, Yosemite and the Grand Canyon parks will be viewed.

The national parks now cover an area of 7,753,861.6 acres, an area equivalent to 12,113.50 square miles, vice of the department of the Interior of the national park service figured the summer was going to be a great year for visitors to the government playgrounds.

They see attention focused on the parks as never before by reason of President Hoover's visit.

COOS CANDIDATES MUST WAIT COUNT ON SHERIFF RACE

MARSHFIELD, Ore., May 20.—(AP)—The results of the official count is awaited to determine the victor in the race for sheriff of Coos county in the May primaries.

Nomination on the republican ticket in this instance is regarded as meaning ultimate election. The complete unofficial vote gives Henry Mess, incumbent, six votes more than Frank Osmond, Marshfield chief of police. Hess has 2,614 votes to 2,098 for Osmond.

TULSA CITIZENS DEVELOP AIRPORT That Pays, Then Give It To City

TULSA, Okla.—(AP)—After providing this city with a needed airport and developing it into a profitable enterprise, Tulsa business men will turn over the field to the municipality.

How well they succeeded in their effort to give Tulsa a prominent place in aviation is shown by the fact that the number of passengers handled at the airport in March exceeded the combined February totals of Europe's three leading airports at London, Paris and Berlin.

The Tulsa field cleared 9209 passengers in March, nearly 3000 more than the number handled by Crocydon, LeBourget and Tempelhof airports in the previous month.

When the need for an adequate airport became apparent two years ago following an announcement that airmail service had been obtained for Tulsa, the group of business leaders formed the Tulsa Airport corporation, realizing the opportunity to make the city an aviation center might be lost if the building of an airport had to await the voting of bonds.

The corporation bought 400 acres of land near Dawson, northwest of the city, and built the present airport.

TEXAS JIM BAKER ADMITS POISONING NIGHT WATCHMAN

NEW YORK, May 20.—(AP)—James "Texas Jim" Baker, confessed slayer of Henry Gaw, laboratory night watchman, pleaded guilty to second degree murder at his trial today.

Gaw, 25 and like Baker, a former sailor, was poisoned a year ago last December in the Guggenheim laboratory in the Bronx. Baker, a former employe of the laboratory, was listed among the suspects. He was arrested recently in Detroit, returned here and indicted, but his readiness to confess to the Gaw murder, and eight others believed mythical, led police to doubt his sanity.

Baker had been under observation of an alienist appointed by the court.
