

# FEDERATION WILL SEEK TAX SLASH

## Business and Professional Women Resolve in Favor of Greater Exemption for Single People in Income Tax—Thank Clubs.

Resolutions drawn up by the committee and adopted by members of the Oregon Federation of Business and Professional Women's clubs in session in this city last week end, were received in Medford today.

Support of the Cabell bill, appointment of a secretary of education in the president's cabinet, and a move for greater income tax exemption for single people is promised in the list along with a vote of appreciation of the hospitality extended to the convention guests by the Medford and Grants Pass clubs.

The resolutions read as follows: Whereas, we cherish our American citizenship and that we may not be deprived of this privilege, either by marriage or change of residence,

Be it resolved, that this State Federation work for the passage of the Cabell bill in congress.

Whereas, the National Federation is advocating the appointment of the secretary of education in the president's cabinet,

# EASTSIDE AREA ASKS FOR ROAD SOUTH OF LINKS

## Shorter Route to Highway Is Sought for District South of Golf Ground—Court Views Land.

Residents of the district south of the Rogue Valley Golf course, headed by Charles Stack, appeared before the county court this morning, at its regular session, and asked that they be given a road south of the golf course, to afford a shorter route to main-traveled highways, and this city.

They claim they are now compelled to travel a circuitous route, and that a new route could be built without any great expenditure, serve 50 families and farms, and afford a quicker transportation for products of field and orchard.

The county court journeyed to the scene, inspected the route, the lay of the land, and walked the entire length of the golf course. They promised to take the matter under advisement. A year ago a plea for a road was filed by the same area.

The county cruise of timber, in charge of E. A. Elder, is now under way in the southeast portion of the county, along Jenny Creek, and in the Lincoln district. They have been operating about a week, and good progress is underway. The cruise requested the county court to purchase a pair of second-hand Ford's, for use in the timber, on the ground it will save time now devoted to walking, and aid in the double-checking. The county court is also considering this problem with the probability the request will be granted.

The remainder of the regular session was devoted to the transaction of routine, and approving the first bills for primary election expenses.

# EGG PRICES CUT BY INDEPENDENTS

PORTLAND, May 21.—(AP)—Several large independent dealers were reported to have reduced their buying and selling prices on eggs 1c, following reductions at other coast markets. The Washington co-operative were said to have made a substantial cut. The

official quotations in Portland remained unchanged, however, since no action toward reduction is announced by the Pacific co-operative poultry producers, who control about 60 per cent of production in this territory. The supply situation was said to be growing more top-heavy daily.

Butter prices were fairly steady following Tuesday's decline and supply and demand were generally about equalized.

# Wall Street Report

NEW YORK, May 21.—(AP)—The stock market again found itself at a fork in the road today, and after considerable hesitancy took the turn leading downhill. Speculation for the rise, concentrated in the rail and food shares, made some headway, but was hampered by another spell of speculative apathy, and the weekly steel trade reviews were rather disheartening.

The first railway operating income reports to appear for April have provided little encouragement. The freight car loadings figures for the second week of May showed a decline of nearly 9000 cars from the previous week, when an upturn

of about 35,000 was shown. The market rallied under short coverings in the last few minutes. U. S. Steel regained about 2 points of its loss, but the undertone remained heavy, and stocks generally showed substantial net losses. Total sales approximated 2,250,000 shares.
