

# Noted Speed Boat Pilots Coming For Legion Regatta Sunday

## FAST CRAFT TO VIE WITH HOME TOWN BOATMAN

Adams, Holt and Ferguson Attracted by Big Purses — Class 'D' Race Promises Thrills.

One of the greatest galaxies of outboard speedboats and nationally known pilots ever brought together in competition on the Pacific coast will participate in the American Legion's second outboard motorboat regatta on Emigrant lake, Sunday, May 25th. Three noted speed pilots today notified the regatta committee that they expect to bring their craft here for the big meet and two others tentatively have accepted invitations.

Johnny Adams and Charley Holt who have broken nearly every class B record for outboard craft, and Percy Ferguson, holder of the fastest record ever made by an outboard shell, are expected to arrive in a few days from Newport Beach, Calif., with Crandal Comet boats.

Ferguson, crowned champion at the national meet held in Peoria, Ill., established the existing record of 49.47 miles per hour in an outboard powered boat.

Will Elliott, who is known to followers of the aquatic sport as the "father" of outboard racing, and the committee he is bringing a new Westcraft "32" motor here for the regatta.

Another noted pilot, Bunny Thompson, who has his famous boat, "Flying Cloud," on the lake last Sunday, expects to remain here and enter in class B. Thompson piloted the "Flying Cloud" to a new world's record New Year's day at Lake Merritt and all but equaled his mark again last Sunday at the lake, making a lap a few seconds slower than his best previous time.

Henry "Heinie" Fluhrer, the "Flying Dutchman," whose boat, "Black Friday," captured the class C, D, and free-for-all events at the first regatta, will compete against the California pilots and hopes to break the record set by Thompson's craft.

Fluhrer's boat is powered by a Seahorse "24" engine and has been clocked at 43 miles per hour. Judging from the list of entries in the regatta class Fluhrer will have a hard field to beat.

Many Local Entrants Medford entries in the races will include Al Stevens' craft, "Miss Medford," powered with a Seahorse "24" engine with a hull similar to Fluhrer's craft. "Roxy Ann," owned by "Dutch" Welsh, has been remodelled and will be equipped with a Seahorse "32" engine, the fastest motor available. Sid Smith has also announced his new Elsinor boat will be equipped with the same type of engine.

The new motors are the latest product of the Johnson Outboard Motor company and were shipped direct from the factory by express in order to insure their being here for the races. Outside of one or two in the state of Washington they are the only ones shipped to the Pacific coast.

Three entries are expected from Salem and Geo. Hurley and John Pierstein again will bring their outfits down from Albany for the races. Hurley and Pierstein have worked their outfits over and have announced their intention of beating Fluhrer in return for the double defeat he scored last month. Jimmy Smith is still undecided in which event he will enter his craft. Herb Stranz, John Dolbert Stan Smith and J. V. Watson also are listed among Medford entries in the various classes.

Klamath Craft Coming Klamath Falls will be represented with some faster outfits than they had in the last races.

The Electric Wiring company will furnish a high powered, broadcast system on the shores of the lake and the results of the races and various sidelights of the events will be announced through a system of amplifiers. Due to previous dating it was impossible to secure the Standard Oil Co. system. However, they are cooperating to the fullest extent in other ways.

At a meeting last night, the regatta committee and the Medford Boat club decided to stage four races. The first three will be B, C and D races of five miles each and the last will be a 10 mile race. Plenty of thrills and perhaps a few spills will be in order when the class D race gets under way, followed by a free-for-all race which should prove an exciting climax.

Awards in the form of merchandise will be given and total three hundred and sixty dollars for the four events. Special prizes will be offered for the fastest lap and such other events.

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## COAST LEADERS SUFFER DEFEAT FROM TRAILERS

Los Angeles Crosses Up Solon Sweep By 8 to 5 Victory—Seals Drub Oaks 15-2 in Swatfest.

It's anybody's race in the first half of the Pacific Coast league season, and yesterday's games served to tighten matters up further, with the leaders losing and the trailers generally faring better.

Sacramento lost to the Angels and held first place by a half game margin only, due to the crushing defeat administered the Oaks by San Francisco. Manager Zamloch, anxious to move that short distance into first place if possible, called on Pete Duglia, star hurler from Napa, to deal with the Seals. Duglia lasted for only a part of the first inning, in which Frank Crosetti and "Red" Wingo led a five-run batting attack. The hitting spree continued at the expense of Dumovich and Kasich, the Acorns' relief men, and the Seals totalled 15 markers on 21 hits to Oakland's two runs on seven hits.

## Angels on Rampage

Los Angeles showed its disrespect for league leaders by drubbing Laurie Vinel, Sacramento hurler, out of the box in the first inning. Jones also failed to hold the Angels, and the total for the south-coast runners after the fourth inning, but the Seals could not get to Baecht, Los Angeles twirler, and finished with five runs, three too few.

Among the clubs now occupying the second division, the Missions splurged by drubbing the Seattle Indians, 17 to 1, at San Francisco. Led by Ike Boone, who scored two singles, a double and a home-run, the Missions pounded Lamanski and Hubbell for their first 16 tallies, and made the last at the expense of Simoni.

## Ducks Down Stars

The Portland Beavers, so far undisputed holders of last place, took the Hollywood Stars into camp by an 11 to 6 score, in a game featured by four homers, two being hit out by second baseman Brannon of the Stars.

## JOE MARCUS WINS NOD OVER 'FRISCO BOY IN PORTLAND

PORTLAND, Ore., May 21.—(AP)—Leaping Joe Marcus, Portland lightweight, took a 10-round decision over Paddy Walthier, San Francisco, in a fast bout here last night, in which no great damage was done.

The feature of the evening was the 10-round mix between Mickey Dolan, Portland, and Al Gotthardt, German lightweight. Mickey found the German's tough boy with a baffling style that made him hard to reach effectively. Mickey did considerable hard thrashing in the latter rounds.

Ray McQuillan, clever Denver colored welterweight, won a well-earned decision over Jimmy Dolan, Portland. McQuillan outboxed the Portlander in nearly every round and clinched the decision in the tenth with a couple of hard ones to Dolan's jaw.

Ernie Beale, Portland and Larry Sarratt, San Francisco, heavyweights, slugged each other for six rounds with everything but the ring posts. Beale taking the nod, Able Israel, Portland bantam, took an easy decision over Bernie Miller, Portland, in the four-round curtain raiser.

## WRESTLERS USING AIR FOR TRAVELS

PORTLAND, Ore.—(Special)—Wrestlers often make use of that most effective tactic—the "flying tackle." Whether or not air travel makes one more adept in his use is not known, but nevertheless four prominent heavyweight grapplers travel almost exclusively via West Coast Air Transport's Seattle-Portland-San Francisco route from match to match.

Howard Cantonwine, doubly ex-University of Iowa grappler, and Dr. Karl Sarpola of Cleveland are among the other noted bone-crushers to travel with West Coast.

## NATIONAL RACE HAS SPOTLIGHT AMONG MAJORS

Only Two Clubs Hold Positions Through Tuesday Play — Giants Dive to Fourth Place.

The amazing race of the National league clubs for the higher places in the standing has stolen the show in big league baseball from their rival circuit. Four games were played yesterday in each major league, and while the American was offering but one change in the standing, a shift of the seventh and eighth place clubs, the other circuit left just two clubs in their former posts.

The Brooklyn Robins, who became the leaders only Sunday, held their place by trouncing the Phillies, still the tail enders, 16 to 6. All the rest sluffed about. The New York Giants dropped from second to fourth place for the day's highest fall while Pittsburgh made the best climb, going from fifth to third.

Even the Boston Braves, ranked of all outsiders, found themselves in the struggle as they dived the Giants for their fourth victory in the five game series. Led by Wally Recker, a hard hitting center from Los Angeles, the Braves pulled out a ten inning triumph, 4 to 3.

## COAST LEAGUE WILL TRY OUT NIGHT GAMES

SAN FRANCISCO, May 21.—(AP) Night baseball, which many managers believe will save the American pastime from financial decay since its successful trial by Des Moines this spring, will make its debut in the Pacific Coast league at Sacramento, June 16, according to an announcement by Lew Moreland, president of the league leading Stars.

Oakland's Acorns will vie with the Senators in the first coast venture at knocking high flies into the floodlights, and other teams will have their opportunities soon after. Lew Moreland stated that five regular games will be played at night each week from then on.

## WOULD CONTINUE WOMEN'S GAMES

BERLIN, May 21.—(AP)—Strong pressure in favor of the continuance of women's Olympic track and field events in the 1932 games at Los Angeles was brought to bear today by the International Amateur Athletic federation in session here.

Unless the women are allowed to compete, the world's male athletes, as represented in the I. A. A. F., will adopt a policy of non-cooperation in regard to the Olympics, it was indicated.
