TENGWALD WILL HANDLE SHRINE MIKE PROGRAM

Broadcast Begins at Six o'Clock Tonight—Prominent Masons On Program to Tell of Ceremonial.

A genuine surprise is in store for KMED's radio audience tonight when the Shrine present their broadcast just preceding the Hillah Temple ceremonial in Ashland Saturday. Beginning at 6:00 o'clock tonight some interesting announcements will be made by the Shrine, a quarter hour radio time being furnished through the courtesy of the Big Pines Lumber company of this city. Following the fifteen minute broadcast of Mail Tribune news items, the main Shrine radio program will begin at 6:30 o'clock, the half hour being supplied by the Harwood Photo studio of this city. Several prominent Hillah Shrine members will speak before and after the special musical program, the real surprise of the evening.

Irish Songs

The big hit of the Shrine broadcast will be fifteen minutes of Irish songs presented by the nationally famous KNX radio star, Robert Griffin, the Vagabond Baritone. Mr. Griffin's contribution to the Shrine program was secured through electrical transcription, through the cooperation of KMED's staff. Evelyn Kemp, pianist, will be the accompanist for the Vagabond Baritone. This program will be the first of its kind in southern Oregon, introduced by the Shrine, and similar programs by Mr. Griffin and other outstanding radio acts will be featured by KMED.

Carl Y. Tengwald, chief rabban of Hillah Temple, will be master of ceremonies at tonight's radio broadcast. Potentate Detrick, East Potentate "Jerry" Jerome and other Shrine members will be featured on the program tonight.

County Health Department Activities and News

Dr. Moore says in his book, Nutrition of Mother and Child: "The World was taught us many things regarding the physical strength and weakness of our people. Our pride in our national health was rudely shattered when the draft law revealed the astounding facts that one-third of our adult males were physically unfit."

"Probably the same test applied to our females would give similar results. The causes of the imperfections and ill-health of adult life are now being sought at their source—the mistakes in infancy."

"The helpless, innocent, crying babe, once considered a by-product of obstetrics, has become the center of a sociological and medical movement such as the world has never known. The baby is coming into its own, and his first and greatest demand is for the food God intended—his mother's milk."

It is evident to those who are making a close study of infancy that we must revert to the practices of our fore-parents, to the time when everyone thought that every mother could and every mother did nurse her infant.

Is it not a crushing indictment that civilized man, with all his knowledge and science, has adopted a feeding regime for his offspring that in a large measure cannot compare in safety and efficiency to that of the semi-civilized man of hundreds of years ago?
