## STRAWBERRIES CHEAPER AS RECEIPTS INCREASE

## DEMONSTRATIONS ATTENDED TODAY BY DELEGATIONS

Delegations of interested orchardists and agriculturists attended the two drainage demonstrations held today under the auspices of the county agents' office.

The first one held was at the Paul Scheter orchard in the Central Point locality, this morning where the collecting drainage system of that orchard was demonstrated before twenty-five orchardists. Arch Work, representative of the U. S. department of agriculture who has been here for a long time past studying water table conditions, discussed the engineering features and County Agent F. P. Wilcox discussed effects of high water tables on tree and crop growth.

The afternoon demonstration began at 1:30 at the Olaf Olsen orchard on the Old Stage road, where the interception drainage system of that orchard was studied and discussed before an attendance of orchard men, and with Messrs. Work and Wilcox leading the discussion as at the morning demonstration.

## SPARROW ACCEPTS CHAIRMANSHIP OF LAND CONFERENCE

Judge Alex Sparrow will be general chairman of the Mid-Pacific Empire Agricultural Economic conference, which is to be held in Medford the latter part of this year.

County Agent R. G. Fowler has been appointed by Judge Sparrow as chairman of a committee to arrange the date of the conference and the complete program for same. Mr. Fowler will call all the county agents of northern California and southern Oregon, together in the near future to prepare a program which will completely cover agriculture in this section.

The conference is being sponsored by the Northern California-Southern Oregon Development association.

## ASHLAND MINE IS SOLD FOR \$50,000

Sale of the old Ashland Mine, located near this city, to P. B. Wickham, prominent mining operator of southwestern Oregon was announced today by E. T. Staples, Ashland realtor. The mine was purchased from Attorney E. D. Chicago. Wickham has held an option on the property since 1929.

The purchase price was not announced, but is understood to have been in the neighborhood of \$50,000. The Ashland Mine includes approximately 450 acres, patent land and mining property and is located about four miles from Ashland. Previous production of the mine is said to exceed \$1,000,000 which was principally recovered by a five-stamp mill on ore ranging in value from \$15 to \$40 per ton. Underground development amounts to about 16,000 feet, exploring the vein for a length of 1500 feet and to a depth of 900 feet by shaft.—Ashland Tidings.

## PUPILS RECEIVE DIPLOMAS TODAY

The county school graduation exercises attracted over 1000 people to Ashland today when 233 eighth grade diplomas were presented to students from 48 schools. H. C. Seymour, state club leader, presided the main address of the forenoon session, the feature of which was the presentation of diplomas. Quite an extensive program was also planned for this afternoon, including a music memory contest with participants present from lower grades from many rural schools.

The students met at the Chautauque building at 9:20 and marched in parade formation to the junior high school where the exercises took place. Only a very small percentage of students failed in their state examinations, which, if they had been passed by all applicants, would have resulted only in a few more diplomas.

have been opened, the men employed on the insect control work are transported on trucks from park headquarters to the infested areas where control work is being carried on.

This work was started on May 15, when 30 men with axes and saws were aligned for an attack upon those encroaching forest pests that have been responsible for the gray, dead forests in the north half of Crater Lake.

In 1929 this beetle invasion was reduced through control work from an epidemic to an endemic stage, and by the work planned for the early season of 1930, it is hoped that absolute control of the mountain pine beetle in the park forests will be the reward for the effort put forth to save the remaining scattered stands of lodge pole pine and the more valuable white pine within the park boundaries.
