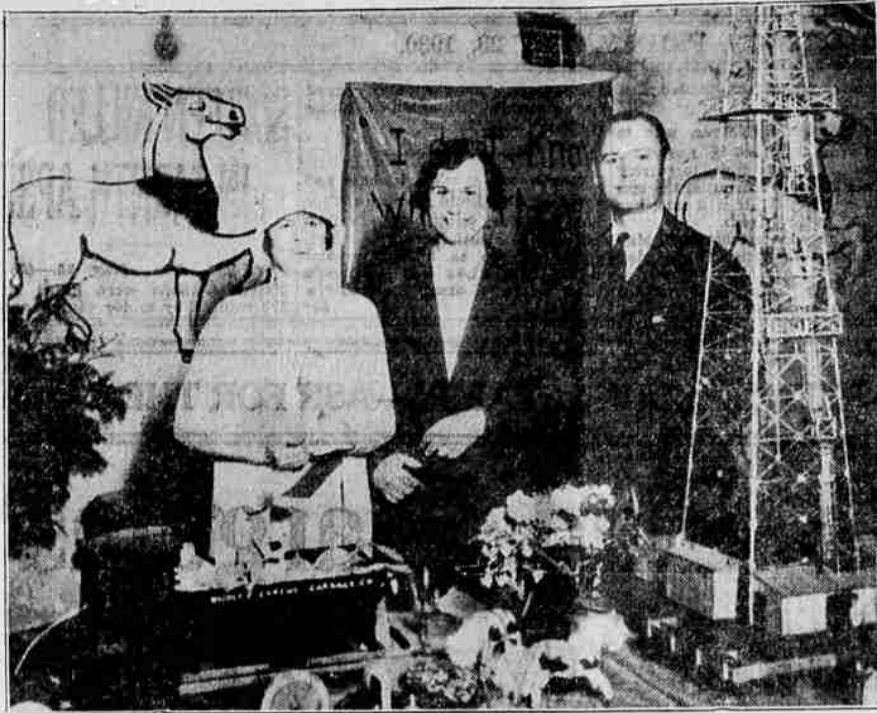
### DEUEL BUILDING BLAZE ORIGIN IS YET UNDECIDED

### RESERVATION ROADS BILL PASSES SENATE

WASHINGTON, May 23.—(Sp.) The senate yesterday passed and sent to the house, bills by Senator Wheeler of Montana, providing for construction of roads on Indian reservations in Montana.

One would authorize \$60,000 to cover a 15-mile stretch between Glacier park and Browning, 27 miles between Glacier Park and Heart Butte, and 24 miles between Browning and Heart Butte, on the Blackfoot reservation.

Another would provide \$40,000 for roads on the Rocky Boy reservation and the third \$40,000 for roads on the Fort Belknap Indian reservation.
