NEED WARM DAYS TO HELP FISHING JS WARDEN'S VIEW

F. M. Brown of Portland, the well known veteran special deputy warden of the state game commission, who is on duty again in Jackson county, assisting Roy Parr, the regular deputy warden of the county, in patrolling the county, while in the city today from Ashland stated that fishing in the river and other streams has been held back by the recent cold weather, but will greatly improve with a few days of warm weather.

Questioned as to whether he would remain in the state game commission employment or return to Brownsville, Ore., to publish the Brownsville Times of that city, which he purchased last March and which he formerly owned and edited for years, Mr. Brown smiled and said, "Not just yet."

"I purchased the paper," he said, simply to have a place to light, or fall back on, whenever in the future I give up my connection with the game commission. That may be years yet." He took possession of the paper about April 1 and has another man publishing it for him.

Mr. Brown quit the newspaper work in 1915 to take over the state game commission job and for 15 years continuously since then, despite the various changes in administration, has served in that capacity.
