

Fair California Net Stars Win French Doubles Championship

HELEN EXHIBITS TOP FORM WITH MISS RYAN SAID

Three Matches at Auteuil Taken Without Loss of Single Set—Ovation Given By Spectators.

AUTEUIL, France, May 24.—(AP)—The powerful American combination of Helen Wills Moody and Elizabeth Ryan captured the French women's doubles tennis championship today, defeating in time Yvette Barbillier of France in the final 6-3, 6-1.

The Californians won the title without loss of a single set. Through play and default they had to play only three matches and won them in short order.

Queen Helen, paired with one of the finest doubles players in the world, thus added a second French title to the singles crown which she is now defending.

Mrs. Moody and Miss Ryan played invincible tennis, especially in the second set where Helen, for the first time in her present appearance in France, reached top form.

The Americans won through their own superior playing, not the result of errors of their adversaries.

Marks Change for Helen
Although Helen has captured singles honors easily for the last two years she has been unsuccessful in doubles, having been eliminated last year when paired with Edith Cross and the previous year when she had Penelope Anderson as her partner.

In the veteran Californian who has lived in England for many years, she found the perfect partner. A master of doubles court tactics, the famous chop stroke which she used in perfectly with Helen's strong driving and serving game.

The Americans received a great ovation as they took the court at the Roland Garros stadium against the French stars.

About 2000 spectators were in the stands despite the early hour and threatening weather.

Bill Tilden and Wilbur Coen, American representatives in the French doubles championship chase, were eliminated in the quarter-finals by the French team of Jean Borotra and Rene De Buzelot. The scores were 6-2, 8-10, 5-7, 6-3, 7-5.

OREGON GOLFERS IN PRACTICE FOR TOURNAMENT OPENING

EUGENE, Ore., May 24.—(AP)—A bombardment of golf balls powered by well armed mashies, niblicks and other golfing paraphernalia resounded over the Eugene Country Club golf course today as the advance guard of golfers from three states began practicing against the 72-year course.

Entries from California, Oregon and Washington swelled the total list to 182. Phil Fry, secretary of the State Golf association, said. The tournament will open Monday with the qualifying rounds being played by women. Men will qualify Tuesday.

Frank Dolph, state champion for 1925 and 1926, is generally regarded as the logical contender for the 1930 crown. With Doc Willing and Don Moe still in England, where they very gracefully showed the Englishmen how to play the Scotch game, absent, the crown will fall to some one else.

Another Dolph, Vincent, who now holds the intercollegiate college championship, is considered a strong chance of eliminating his brother from first honors.

Browns Weak in Hitting and Hurling—Stewart Effective in Six Games Out of Nine.

The St. Louis Browns are fifth in the American league pennant standing, but with the aid of Walter Stewart they get a share of victories.

The club is suffering from weak hitting and weak pitching, ranking at the bottom of the league's club batting averages, but Stewart has developed into a consistent hurler and usually a victorious one. He has taken part in nine games, finishing one of them, and has completed seven of his eight starts. His current record is six victories and three defeats as he proved quite effective against the Cleveland Indians yesterday to give St. Louis a 5 to 3 victory.

Schoold Perfect
Socks Schoold of the Boston Braves has finished eight games in a row for the only perfect record in either major circuit, but otherwise the Brownie hurler is doing quite well. His nearest rival in his own league are Milton Gaston of the Boston Red Sox and Ted Lyons of Chicago, who have six complete games apiece. Very few pitchers in either circuit have completed as many as four games.

The only other scheduled American league game, between Detroit and Chicago, was rained out.

The Brooklyn Robins again demonstrated the efficacy of slugging in the leading National league contest as they hammered the Braves into a 4 to 2 defeat and again gained the top rung of the league ladder.

Pirates Win
The Pittsburgh Pirates tightened their hold on third place, increasing their margin to five full games, by beating the Chicago Cubs, 7 to 0, while the fourth place New York Giants dropped their second in succession to Philadelphia, 9 to 8.
