EMIGRANT DAM REGATTA TODAY MECCA OF FANS

Contrary to reports that gained credence throughout the city last evening, before and after the speed boat parade, Henry's Flying Dutchman, Fluhrer will probably be in the races today at Emigrant dam. Fluhrer contracted engine and motor trouble last week, and engine replacements arrived yesterday by air. A force of mechanics under the direction of George Barnum worked all night making repairs, and endeavoring to get the engine in working order.

Seventeen boats will provide entertainment in the outdoor motorboat races at Emigrant Lake this afternoon, including ships from California and Willamette valley. Arrangements have been completed to handle a large crowd of spectators and officers will be present to direct traffic. Quite a delegation of boat fans are expected from northern California.

A parade of craft to take part in the events was held last evening and attracted considerable interest in the business section. The parade was led by the American Legion drum corps.

This will be the last race of the year as water will soon be drained out of the lake for irrigation purposes and because of that the attendance is expected to be record-breaking, including many who failed to attend the first regatta.

O.S.C. BOWS TO PHOENIX TROOP OREGON TRACK FIRST IN BOY SQUAD 77 TO 54 SCOUT EVENTS

CORVALLIS, Ore., May 24.—(AP)—For the second successive year the University of Oregon won major track honors for the state by defeating Oregon State college 77 to 54 here today.

Only one state record was broken when Dickson of Oregon set a new dual meet mark by hurling the javelin 195 feet, 11 inches. The former record set by Tack, Oregon, in 1921, was 193 feet, one inch.

Oregon State took only four first places, including the relay race which was forfeited by the Woodfords, Dickson and Lowry, of Oregon, tied for first place honors with eight points each.
