Menaces Lead State Diseases There were 97 cases of measles in the state last week, leading the list of communicable diseases reported, according to the weekly summary by the state board of health. Forty-six of the cases were in Portland. The report also showed 45 cases of chickenpox, three of typhoid fever, six of diphtheria, 14 of scarlet fever, 13 of influenza, 49 of whooping cough, 19 of smallpox, nine of tuberculosis, 19 of pneumonia, 37 of mumps, one of sleeping sickness, three of tick fever and five of erysipelas.
