

# Medford and Albany Outboard Craft Divide Regatta Laurels

## FLUHRER IS LOGGED BY HARD LUCK

### Medford First In Classes C and D—Golden Slipper Wins Free-for-All And Special Event—Fluhrer Turns Turtle.

Medford, entered by Al... and Golden Slipper, entered and driven by George L. Hurley of Albany, shared honors with first places each at the American Legion outboard motorboat regatta at Emigrant lake, south of Ashland, held Friday.

Fluhrer, who had been leading the winning wire, but was scratched by the big bits of entertainment of the day when it turned in the free-for-all race at the end of the third lap, giving Fluhrer a through drenching. Hurley also took first in a special event.

Golden Slipper Surprise. This race was won in 8:22 minutes at a speed of 25.57 miles per hour. Go-2-1, was an easy second for four laps but at the finish of the fifth Golden Slipper took the turn in a great way and finished second, just ahead of the local boat, in 8:28 minutes, two seconds behind.

Fluhrer was able to repair his boat in time to enter the free-for-all and gave Miss Medford a good race for the first lap, but the former took the lead in the second lap and maintained it with Black Friday attempting to cut it down. Hurley, when Fluhrer came to the finish line on the third lap, his boat striking a small floating stick, shot out of the water like a flying fish and turned over, with the driver thoroughly drenched and perhaps a little warm under the collar for the climax of his day of ill-luck. The upset is said to have cracked the engine and broken a fly on the boat the night before.

Fastest Lap. Golden Slipper, with four new spark plugs, was out to win and dashed to the lead for several laps and then took the lead, holding it with a safe margin which Joe Myers, driver of the local boat, was unable to cut down. Hurley finished first in 15:17 and made the fastest lap of the day when he completed the third of the 10-lap race in 1:28, making a speed of 45 miles per hour. Miss Medford finished second in 1:33 and Go-2-1 came in third a good distance behind. No. 2 Stepper, Herb Strang and NGSME finished farther behind and one or two of the boats were scrapped by the winners.

A special race between Golden Slipper and Flying Cloud, the former driven by George Hurley and the latter by Bunny Thompson of Oakland, was not an exciting affair. Golden Slipper took the lead in the second lap and held on until the finish of the five-lap affair. Thompson lost ground on the turns, Hurley going around them beautifully and shot far ahead of his opponent. However, Flying Cloud made up for lost ground in the

straightaway only to lose again on the turns. Thompson laid down in the boat, apparently to cut down wind resistance. He finished the race in 7:32 in 10 laps and Thompson was 19 seconds behind.

Good Announcing. A loud speaking system, with Carl Y. Tenenwald and Lee Bishop at the microphone, kept the crowd informed on race results through telephone connection with the judges' barge, where Humboldt Gregg was in charge of the transmitter. Photograph music was played between and during races.

Officials of the race were as follows: H. G. Moore, general chairman; O. O. Alexander, J. C. Thompson and S. E. Mendelhall, judges; Everett Grayson, Emil Brophy and Don Newbury, timers; C. T. Baker, starter; C. V. Tenenwald and Lee Bishop, announcers; Robert Wilson, registrar; R. E. Barnhardt, special representative of the Standard Oil company for outboard races, aided in the program.

It is likely this will be the last race of the year on Emigrant lake as water will soon be drained off for use by the Talent Irrigation district, which has its high Emigrant dam at one end.
